U of O Meet
As a follow up, the Northwest Conference on Industrial Relations was announced at the University of Oregon on October 16. The industrial report might be brought up to date from year to year by the issuance of supplemental data, which would be included.

Following the report of Mr. Walsh, Art Schaefer of Cottage Grove, committee chairman, opened the meeting for a question and answer period, which dealt largely with what type of report was to be printed and how many copies were to be printed. Mr. Schaefer, who presided, asked the group if a committee from each community should be appointed now to confer with Mr. Walsh and it was decided to let the matter stand until the September meeting.

Timber Sales
During the question and answer period, Judge Day T. Bayly, county judge, told the group that the county court had debated offering some county timber for sale for fear that too much timber sold might lead to over cutting. J. R. Bruckhart, local supervisor of the Willamette National Forest, made the interesting observation that the Willamette national forest was not cutting the allowable amount and he said this was true of the other forests, so far as he knew.

About 27 people attended the Monday evening meeting, representing practically every section of the county. From here in addition to Art Schaefer, chairman, was W. C. Martin. In case our readers have not been following the activities of this committee and this article sounds too technical, the real purpose behind the county wide movement is to provide more diversification of industry. As matters stand now, lumber provides 88 percent of the county's payroll.

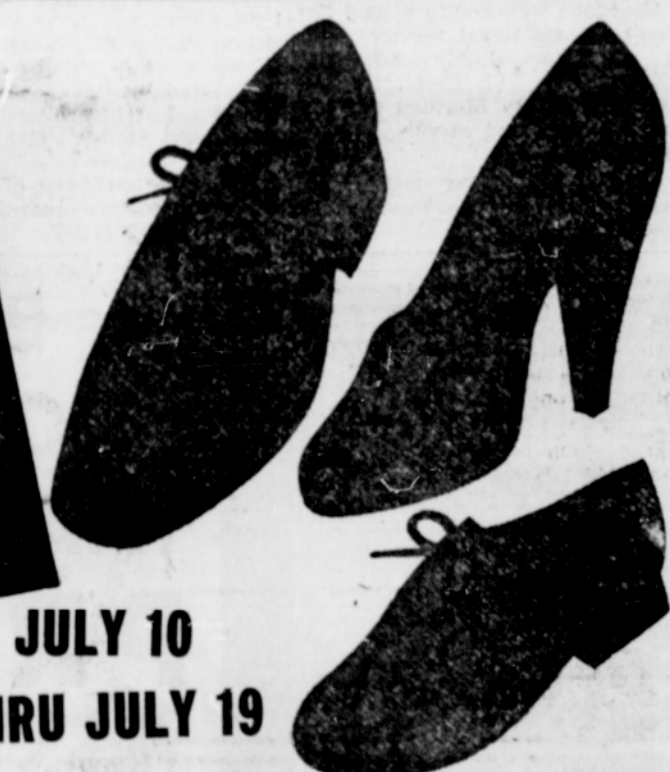
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
