Square Deal Barber Shop Is Featured In Barber Journal

The Square Deal Barber Shop of Cottage Grove made page 1 of the July, 1952 issue of the Barber's Journal. The Journal carried a picture of the Square Deal shop, showing four barbers and four chairs. The picture was taken in 1948, but was side-tracked for four years and published on the cover of the current issue.

A story carried with the picture tells of the success of Charles Boslaugh, an old time barber, who founded the Square Deal Barber Shop here in 1923, a one chair shop, located behind a jewelry store. Boslaugh attributes his success to the fact that he gave his customers the best that could be had in the way of barber service. In 1912 he installed white enamel chairs, an innovation for that period. The shop has been a shining example of spotless sanitation.
