Parade Planned

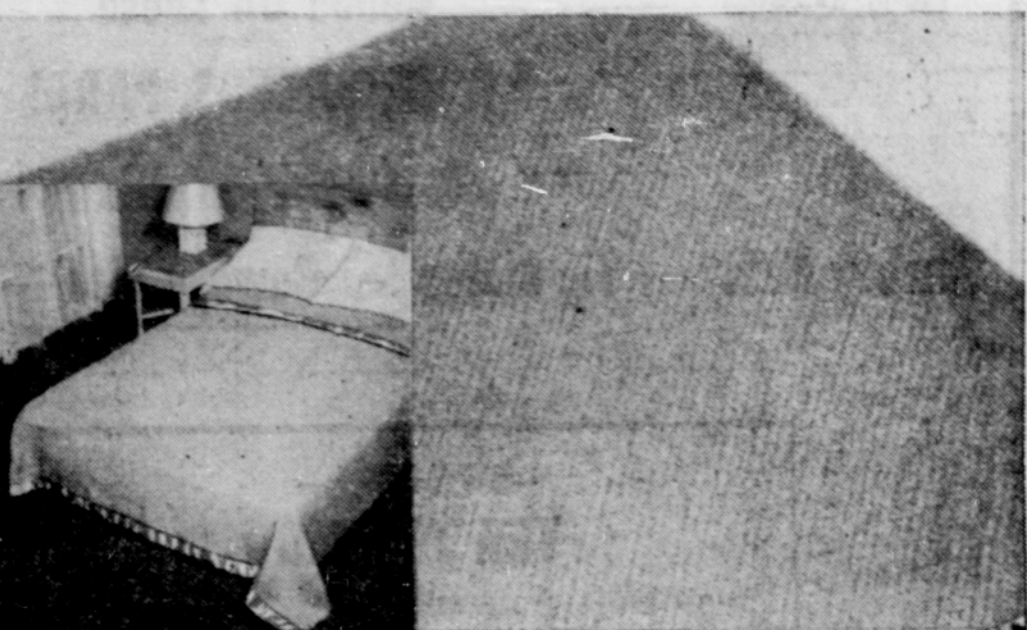
