Congressmen to Participate In BLM Program Conference

A delegation including eight congressmen, a number of conservation officials of the Department of the Interior, and others, is to visit Bureau of Land Management forest management and reforestation areas in Oregon after inspecting range reseeded projects in Idaho, it was reported this week by Roscoe E. Bell, Northwest regional administrator of the Bureau at Portland.

Congressmen in the party will include Ben F. Jensen from Iowa, Wayne N. Aspinall, Colorado, Hamer H. Budge, Idaho, Wesley A. D'Ewart, Montana, William H. Harrison, Wyoming, John R. Murdock, Arizona, W. F. Norrell, Ar-

kansas, Norris Poulson of California, and possibly Harris Ellsworth and Senator Guy Cordon.

To Arrive 17th

The groups will arrive in Portland early on the morning of July 17, where it is expected that Governor McKay and former Governor Sprague, now chairman of the O & C Advisory Board, will join them. Senator Cordon and Representative Ellsworth may also be present. The day will be spent in a conference on forest land management, to be held at the Multnomah Hotel.

The next morning the conference will go to the field to see sustained yield forest management in action. Two buses will take the group to the Black Rock area west of Dallas, Oregon. There they will see systems of forest management and most phases of modern logging operations. The tour will also include an inspection of an old burn covering 20,000 acres of private and government lands which are being cooperatively reforested by private and government funds and efforts by both hand planting young trees and sowing Douglas-fir seed by helicopter.

After returning from the woods the conferees will be welcomed to the City of Dallas by Mayor Hollis S. Smith and County Judge C. F. Hayes.

At the request of Congressman Ellsworth time will be provided on Saturday for the county judges from the 18 O & C Counties in western Oregon to meet with members of the Congressional group to discuss legislation affecting the O & C lands.

Motorists in this area will be much closer to Alaska by automobile from now on. On July 1 the John Hart highway from Prince George to Dawson Creek in British Columbia opened to travel.

The 265 mile route meets the Alaska highway at Dawson Creek. Motorists from the western areas will no longer have to make the circuitous trip through Edmonton, Alta, to join the Alcan highway.

7 Years Building

Seven years under construction at a cost of approximately nine and three-quarters million dollars, the broad gravelled highway climbs and winds gently through some of the most rugged and beautiful country in the province, B.C., officials told the Oregon motoring organization.

Travelers from Vancouver, B.C. can cut nearly 700 miles off their previous route to the Peace River district, it is claimed. Gasoline may be obtained at mile 29, mile 219 and mile 252; provisions may be obtained at mile 168, mile 175 and mile 252 on the new route.

The B. C. Government Travel Bureau has just released an illustrated folder on the new highway, complete with comprehensive road map.

Coast Guard Starts Recruit Campaign

The U. S. Coast Guard recruiting office in Portland has announced that an intensive drive is now on for the procurement of eligible young men for immediate enlistment in the regular Coast Guard and Coast Guard reserve.

Young men 17 to 25 years of age who can meet the physical and mental standards may be enlisted for a period of four years and assigned to duty at the Coast Guard Training Station, Alameda, Calif. for 12 weeks basic training. After completion of the basic training the new coast guardsman is given ten days leave enroute to his first assignment ashore or afloat.

Tourists Are Told To Leave Wild Pets

If you see a cute, cuddly bear cub or a lovely, spotted fawn wandering around and looking deserted, don't pick him up and take him home!

Contact with human beings is akin to signing the young animal's death warrant, Lloyd Crowe of the Oregon State Motor association touring department points out.

"Every year, unfortunately, hundreds of well-meaning people—who actually love pets—cause endless damage and trouble by interfering with newborn wildlife of all sorts. Once a tiny animal has been touched by a man, woman or child, the chances, in all probability, are that its mother will never come back to take it in charge. The fawn, cub or baby animal may starve or die from lack of parental care and guidance," Crowe said.

The travel official explained that it is illegal to pick up and take away young animals. "As a fawn, bear cub or baby fox grows, it becomes dangerous and no longer suitable as a pet. Then it must either be destroyed or released," Crowe added. "If released back into the woods, it may become the victim of the first predator that happens along, since the animal hasn't learned how to care for itself."
