Program Outlined

The program for boys' camp includes instruction and educational work by representatives of the Oregon Game commission, Oregon State Police, U. S. Naval Reserve, State Forestry department, and others.

According to Commander Innis at the Eugene Naval Training center, Chief Hospitalman Ray Barnes has been authorized to participate in the 4-H camp program. Chief Barnes is in charge of the rifle range and swimming and first aid programs at the boys camp.

Commander Innis stated that he feels the participation of the Naval Reserve is good public relations on the part of the 13th Naval District Reserve program.

Crafts are taught by Max Kummer and the general program is directed by County Extension agents from Douglas, Lincoln and Lane Counties. Other activities include hikes, swimming, setting trap lines, fishing and sports.

Madonna & Arnold Buy Lorane Valley For Remilling Site

Madonna & Arnold Lumber Co. has purchased from the W. A. Woodard Lumber Co. the remaining equipment of the former Lorane Valley Lumber Co. plant located on the south edge of the city limits and will install a dry mill and remanufacturing operation at this location, R. W. Kensit, local manager, said here Wednesday morning.

A 40x140 planing shed is under construction by the J. S. Crepeau Construction Co., and plans have been made to rebuild the fuel bin. Included in the construction program is the construction of a resaw building and installation of resaw equipment with a capacity of 75,000 feet daily.

Office to Move

The loading shed and six dry kilns on the property will be used in the new operation. Offices will be moved to the former Lorane Valley Lumber Co. location. The present mill operations of Madonna & Arnold in the east part of town will be continued, and green lumber transported to the remanufacturing plant for processing.

Mr. Kensit estimated that the planer and dry kiln equipment would be in operation within 30 to 40 days, but it would take at least three months to have the resaw running.

The Lorane Valley plant was sold to W. A. Woodard Lumber Co. last summer but was never used. Part of the large sheds had been removed to the Woodard plant.

PARATROOPER TRAINS

Council Considers Pave Bid, OK's New Lateral Sewer Job

Souvenir Sellers Misrepresent Vets, Commander States

American Legion Commander Ray Fuller in an appeal to City Council at its Monday session asked what could be done about men selling souvenirs in the city at rodeo time in the name of disabled veterans.

Fuller told councilmen that for the past several years men have come into town and sold these favors but that the local organized veterans groups believed they did not represent any authorized organization. A license fee has been sold to these men as individuals at the city hall, according to the city recorder. However, since the men ask for donations instead of selling an article for a set price, council voted to forbid licensing of the sales.

If any misrepresentation in sales is found to exist, according to Richard Thwing, acting attorney, then that would constitute criminal action. The forbiddance of granting the license by the recorder will be backed up by the city attorney, according to his statement.

Youth Happy Again As Clubs, RC Aid Swimming Project

About 100 Cottage Grove youngsters were happy again this week as they stepped from the curbs onto an extra bus headed for Cottage Grove lake and swimming. Local organizations and the Red Cross had rallied to the cause to finance and carry on the extra heavy program.

The swim program, sponsored by the Cottage Grove Recreation committee and financed by the Community Chest, got an unexpected setback last week when about 250 children turned out with bus capacity and finances for only about 160. So committee chairman Bob Dusenberry was forced to limit the Red Cross lessons that started Monday to beginners only.

Raise \$150

"It broke my heart to see children left behind on the curbstone," he said.

So several local service organizations rallied to the cause and donated the needed \$150 to finance a third bus to the lake. It is being driven by Will Dodge, local fireman. He also acts as life guard. Enough funds are expected to carry the whole swim program beyond the original date set of August 1, Dusenberry said.

The third bus will enable intermediate and advanced swimmers to take part in the program, too. They will swim at the north end of the lake, leaving the Wilson creek area for beginners and the junior and senior life saving lessons.

Red Cross Rallyes

The Red Cross also rallied to the cause by sending extra instructors when they saw the heavy sign-up at Cottage Grove. Four teachers will be at Wilson Creek and one at the north lake area.

"Children can still sign up this week for the swim program," Dusenberry said. "This is the best response we have ever had. And we are grateful for the support these local groups are giving us."

Buses now leaving Jefferson are as follows:

Beginning girls, 12:30 p.m.
Intermediates and seniors, 1 p.m.

Beginning boys, 1:45 p.m.

Junior and senior life saving class is from 12 noon to 1 p.m., but the group is small and is providing its own transportation, Dusenberry said.

Dusenberry said he hoped that next year the city would either take over the entire recreation program or that a recreational district would be formed to finance it. (See editorial page 2.)

First teen-age dance will be at Jefferson playground Friday night.

City Council took under advisement a sole bid on the big summer project of paving and improving Taylor and South Tenth street at special session Monday night and also made preliminary plans for the laying of about 5,000 feet of much needed lateral sewers thru-out the city.

Buskirk, Bush and Charneski, local and Eugene contractors, made a lump sum bid of \$64,628.70 for paving of 3,891 feet of street on Taylor and South Tenth streets. The bid was the only one received in response to advertising for bids on the job. The work will be done this summer, if the bid is accepted. Only thing holding it up is furnishing of a prequalification statement to the council on the financial ability of the contractors.

The bid included \$36,996.20 for 2,137 feet on South Tenth street and \$27,632.50 for Taylor.

Under Estimates

"This bid is considerably under my original estimates," City Engineer L. W. Coiner said. Mr. Coiner had originally said it probably would cost about \$10 a front foot, or a total of almost \$80,000.

The bid includes the construction of concrete curbs and gutters. A bid bond of 5 per cent of the job was included. Council will meet July 21 to okay the prequalification statement. If this is satisfactory, an ordinance will be passed authorizing the council to enter into a contract.

Lateral Sewers

Mr. Coiner was authorized by the council to draw up plans and specifications for lateral sewers to be built this summer in the following areas: Lord and Pennoyer, Geer and Lord, North Eighth and vicinity, Chamberlain avenue, Van Buren east of South Tenth, Tyler East of South Tenth, South First, East Madison, South Fifth south of Quincy.

About 5,000 feet of sewer probably will be put in, he said. The costs will be to the property owners and will be financed by the Bancroft bond system the same as the street project.

Sewer districts will be formed. Some petitions to have sewers installed already are in the hands of the city recorder. However, according to law, the sewers are a sanitary measure and may be put in without petition and over any remonstrance.

Water Petition

Acting City Attorney Richard Thwing announced that the Civic Committee was circulating the initiative petition to put the \$275,000 water bond issue to a vote of the people. The petition was given to George Macready of the committee on July 9, according to the city recorder. As of Monday night it had not yet been turned in. A total of at least 30 bona fide signatures of legal voters is required to call the election. Some councilmen have indicated they hoped it could be held yet this summer and some work on the system begun.

Lorane Youth Hurt In Sawmill Mishap

Two accident victims were in good condition at Cottage Grove hospital Wednesday. They were Jay Schurger of Lorane, who lost part of his right hand Monday in a mill accident, and Edward W. Jones of Oakridge, involved in a car accident near Elkton Sunday.

Schurger, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Rodney Schurger, lost part of his right hand at his father's sawmill near the family home at Lorane. An edge had just been installed in the mill and Jay noticed sawdust had piled up under the saw. He started to flick it away when his glove was caught and pulled his hand into the saw. He was rushed to the hospital where surgeons were only able to save his index and little finger.

Jones received shoulder and chest injuries in his accident. He is said to have fallen asleep at the wheel and his car turned over.

Rodeo Accident

Another Lorane man, Floyd Holland, received a broken jaw in a steer riding contest over the week end at Klamath Falls rodeo. He was treated there.

A. A. Sandlin, prominent Drain man injured some time ago when a gun went off and injured him as he was demonstrating it, was released from Cottage Grove hospital Wednesday. The office described him as a "most unusual patient." As his condition improved he baby-sat on the lawn for families who came to visit at the hospital with small children. He also walked to town to the barber shop and attended ball games.

Doctor, Attorney Erect New Office

Ground was broken this week for construction of another new building in the downtown area to house the offices of a local doctor and attorney.

It is being constructed by Richard Thwing and Doris A. Spaulding, wife of Dr. Raymond Spaulding. It will be in two sections, half of which will be the attorney's office and the other half the office of the doctor. It will be located on Whiteaker street adjacent to Smith Furniture. The contractor is H. L. Shields & Son of Eugene. Architect was Tom Balzhiser of Eugene.

The \$18,000 building also will house the office and laboratory for Dr. W. E. Lebow, local dentist. Another office will be rented.

The building will be natural Cedar and plate glass on the exterior, with the interior to be Hemlock and plaster. It will have concrete block firewalls. Heating will be perimeter heat, a floor installation, and a filtered ventilation system also will be installed. It is of contemporary basic design. The flat roof will be of asbestos.

Work is expected to be finished by September 15.

Construction of another new building for another doctor is expected to be finished sometime next month. It is the Merrick building that faces the river near the bridge on Main street.

Annual Show Features Parade, Cowboy Events, Buckaroo Feed

Queen Pat I will lead Saturday's parade and reign over the sixth annual Cottage Grove rodeo at the grounds south of town July 19 and 20. The annual event is sponsored by the Riding club.

Serving on her court will be Princesses Sydney Dobbins, Carolyn Moore, Barbara Forsythe, Alpha Lee and Shirley Boone.

Dora Bradley, 1951 rodeo queen, crowned Pat I with the traditional white Stetson hat at the queen's ball Saturday night held in the armory.

O. M. Patten, chairman of the queen contest, introduced Louis Caldwell, member of the board of directors of the Riding club. Caldwell acted as master of ceremonies and introduced Ed Pyeatt, president of the club; Miss Bradley; Mrs. Chet Purdy of the queen committee and chaperone for the contestants; Queen Pat and the princesses.

The pre-rodeo parade will begin at 11 a.m. Saturday and will follow the regular parade route. Beginning across the bridge on West Main the parade will go through the downtown area, turn right on Eighth street, right again on Washington and on to Fifth, proceeding south on Fifth to the grade school where it will disband. Parade entrants are requested to form at 10:30.

BUCKAROO BREAKFAST

A Buckaroo Breakfast will be served from 6 to 9 a.m. each day of the rodeo by Shrine club members, with part of the proceeds to go to the Crippled Children's hospital. Concessions also will be in charge of the Shriners. Pat Rickard is in charge of the hawkers; Warren Hansen, peanuts; Charles Bozell, soft drinks; Maurie Bottorff, ice cream; Lloyd Griggs, hot dogs; Joe Throop, novelties, and George Macready, pony rides. Hap Wolfard is head of the breakfast crew. Shriners the past two weeks have sported comical Joe College hats advertising their concessions.

Featured among the events at the rodeo will be Jackie Carstens of Roseburg, well known trick rider. Dan Campbell and his famous Palomino, "The Talisman," from his horse ranch on Dillard Road at the north end of the Canas Swale, also will appear. The famous horse was also in events last year. The prize horse also was a starring event in the recent Eugene Hunt club's spring horse show. In 1951 he was named the champion parade horse of the United States, winning 14 ribbons out of 15 classes entered. Mr. Campbell also has ridden the horse in the Pasadena Rose parade the past several years. The Talisman has also hit the movies, appearing in Columbia's "The Palomino" in 1950. He also has appeared on theater stages in Los Angeles for television audiences.

Stock for the rodeo is being furnished by Hank and Bobbie Christensen, and they have been transporting stock, including their famous Brahma bulls, into the rodeo grounds all week. The public has been invited to see the stock at any time.

The second western dance will get underway at 9 p.m. Saturday night in the armory. Music will again be by the Arizona Ranch Hands. Rodeo events will begin promptly at 1:30 p.m. each day.

Merchants and townspeople have turned out in Western garb this week to set the spirit of rodeo time. Merchants will close their doors for the Saturday parade.

The queen and her court were special guests of the Riding club Wednesday evening at a banquet at Anlauf lodge.

DRIVE-YOURSELF CAR FOUND BY POLICE

A drive-yourself automobile, believed to have been stolen in California, was turned over to Hertz Drive-Up-Self System in Eugene Monday by Cottage Grove police.

The car, a 1951 Chevrolet sedan, was found abandoned on the highway south of town Saturday and taken to Gene's Auto Service. The car later was found to have been taken from an Oakland agency of the car service. BONUS DIVISION ADVISES ON LOST, DESTROYED CHECK

In the event a veteran or the next of kin has his bonus check lost, stolen or destroyed, the bonus enabling act provides that the person may receive payment after 60 days of the issue date of the check, by filing an indemnity bond with the State Treasurer for the amount of the warrant.

He should immediately notify the Bonus Division of the loss, giving his name and address, his bonus application number, and including a statement as to whether or not he had endorsed the check.
