In July women are not only looking for pickups and brighteners for their summer wardrobe, but are beginning to think of the new season ahead. With the advent of real summer weather a fresh new summer dress is always welcome, and sales in many of the local stores afford one at a budget price.

Thoughts this week are also on the coming rodeo, with suitable Western garb available in some of the stores.

At PERRY'S are ladies wide brimmed rodeo hats, bright red with white trim, or tan with brown trim. Famous Prior shirts made like a real cowboy's, in small stripes or plain with gay embroidered flowers on the top. Satin ties in many colors complete the

shirt. Traditional blue jeans are also available.

For the beach or sportswear these hot days, try Graff's only shirt (orlon and nylon) in checks, green and white or blue and white. Or nylon linen in white. The shiny rayon shantung shirt blouses are lovely in red, tan or white. T-shirts in cotton knit, sleeveless or with cap sleeve, in a variety of colors go well with shorts. The shorts come in denim, plain or plaid, or in popular sail cloth. Bra tops to match also. For cover-up with shorts or bathing suit are the sailcloth striped beach coats in gay colors. Or try one in white terry cloth.

For the office on a hot day—a gold cloth skirt with sleeveless sheer blouse of nylon. For cool mornings or evenings—a cotton embossed duster goes well over it.

Koret's famous rayon and wool worsted glen plaid pleated skirts, so popular early this spring, are back again for fall. In grey or tan.

For a last summer fling, still lots of pretty sun dresses and sheers. Also playclothes, mix-match pastel denims by Koret. Also playclothes by Cameron, sheer denim, bright blue or grey with red stitch trim. Skirts, battle jackets, shorts and bra tops.

neckline in back, wide collar trimmed in white pique. The famous Ship N' Shore blouses are in, good for now and all fall. In pastel plaid sheer cotton, in gay wide stripes or in plain ping pong material.

Our favorite dress of the week—a wine and black tiny checked sundress all in one piece with white embroidered trim around the low neck and as a panel down the front of the skirt. The shoulders were bare, just gathered and tied with a strip of the material.

Wardrobe pick-up for July at PETERSEN'S. A white embossed cotton two-piece. The full skirt outlined in either black or red band with shiny black or red buttons down the front. Blouse is sleeveless and also had the big buttons for trim.
