MERITORIOUS MARINES MAY GET COMMISSIONS

Headquarters, Marine Corps, announced that a program recently has been approved under which meritorious non-commissioned officers of the Marine Corps reserve, not on active duty, and former meritorious non-commissioned officers of both the reserve and regular Marine Corps may be appointed second lieutenants in the reserve.

This program generally requires that each person tendered a commission must agree to perform at least two years of active service following acceptance of commission. Waiver of the two years active service may be granted by the Commandant of the Marine Corps, if an applicant resides in a community in which an organized reserve unit is located and lacks reserve lieutenants. In such cases, an applicant may identify himself with such unit if he agrees to serve for two years or more therein.

DRUNK DRIVING LEADS IN TRAFFIC CASES

Oregon drivers were convicted of 23,517 moving traffic violations during the first six months of 1952, Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry has reported. Convictions increased by more than 2,000 over the same period last year.

Leading the list was driving while intoxicated with 1,367 convictions and subsequent suspension of driver licenses. Suspension of license for drunk driving is mandatory under Oregon law, Newberry explained.
