Community-Wide Celebration Set
For Presentation of New, Modern Bible

Plans are already underway in Cottage Grove for a community celebration in the fall of the national publication and public presentation of the latest authorized version of the Bible in English.

A total of 91 scholars have been working on the task for 15 years. Reasons for the study were the need for a Bible in modern English and recent discoveries of ancient manuscripts and writings that have provided new resources for the understanding of original meanings of texts. A New Testament version has been in use for some time, but this will be the whole Bible.

The celebration here will be under the sponsorship of the Ministerial association, with Rev. William W. Sutterlin of the Baptist church as chairman. Other committee members are Rev. Evan Williams of St. Andrews Episcopal and Paul Lubbers, associate pastor of the Gibbs Avenue Church of Christ. The local and national Revised Standard Version Bible observance is set for Christian Education Week September 28 to October 5.

"Christians can unite in paying tribute to God's Holy Word," Rev. Sutterlin said. "Our community will be one in more than 3,000 in the United States and Canada which will celebrate the new revision."

Becomes Rally Day

The observance will begin with local church services on Rally Day, Sunday, September 28. The theme will be "The Word of Life in Living Language."

Special exhibits of different Bibles including the texts in the original languages, Hebrew and Greek, will be on display in the city. The committee requests the loan of rare or unique Bibles or foreign translations for use during the week.

Tuesday evening, September 30, a community-wide service is planned at the Methodist church. Dr. Carroll C. Roberts, pastor of the Church of Christ, Eugene, will give a special address. Residents of all communities around Cottage Grove are also invited to attend.

At this service new copies of The Revised Standard Version will be presented to five citizens of the community. The observance committee has already chosen the people to receive the Bibles, but the announcements will not be made until that night.

The observance will close in the local churches on World Communion Sunday, October 5.

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Salvage Timber
Takes Priority
In '53 BLM Sale

In the Bureau of Land Management's 1953 timber sale plan, priority will be given to salvage of fire killed, windthrown, and beetle infested timber. Roscoe E. Bell, Regional Administrator, has announced.

The O & C and public domain lands in western Oregon administered by the Bureau are so seriously affected by the timber killed as a result of extensive fires, severe windstorms, and an epidemic of the Douglas-fir beetle during the last two years that preference must be given the salvage of this timber to prevent a very heavy loss and to help curb the spread of the beetles, Bell said.

The Bureau is inviting lumber operators and others interested in purchasing O & C and public domain timber in western Oregon during calendar year 1953 to submit their suggestions for tracts of timber to be offered for sale.

Local Posse Finds
Escaped Prisoner

A posse, including local police officers and citizens, apprehended an escaped prisoner last Thursday night as he was hiding in tall grass at Kelly field, the local ball park.

The prisoner, who had escaped from a Josephine County sheriff at Creswell earlier that day, was Frank Gaylor, 23, making his second trip to the state penitentiary at Salem.

Gaylor escaped from the window of the men's room at Hollemon's garage in Creswell about 8:30 a.m. Poses looked for him all day. Acting Police Chief Charles Roberts put up a road block at the bridge north of Cottage Grove Thursday morning.

About 5 p.m. the man was brought into Cottage Grove by a truck driver, Ronald Steen. Gaylor had hitched a ride with him about six miles north of town after road blocks had been removed. T. A. Bassonette of Creswell reported to Cottage Grove police that he had seen the driver pick up the prisoner.

Both men told local police they identified him by descriptions that had been sent out. The truck driver said that Gaylor told him to let him out at the stop sign at Highway 99 and Main street and that Gaylor had headed east and down Tenth street.

Officer Jim Dows and Chief Roberts went into Gene's Auto Service on South Tenth to inquire about the man. They reported that they found out later he was using the phone in the garage at the time, presumably to call a taxi. When he saw the police the man ducked out and threw away his telltale red shirt, Roberts said.

Horace Wolfard, who lives in the ball field area, was the man who apprehended Gaylor about 6:45 p.m. as he hid in tall grass near the rest room at the field. Wolfard brought him out at the point of a rifle.

Four local officers, including Roberts, Dows, Eldon Erickson and Jim Hungerford, plus about a dozen local citizens, two state policemen and a deputy sheriff were on the job. Josephine County Sheriff Lloyd Lewis took over the prisoner and took him to Salem to begin a two-year sentence for forgery. He had previously served on the same charge.

Roberts said Lewis told him he had been on the job many years and this was the first prisoner that had escaped him. He commended the local police for their swift action in catching the prisoner.

The Sheriff's Posse, which had combed the Creswell area all that day, arrived here just after the man had been caught.
