"The Gift of God," A Religious Drama, Scheduled for Reed Campus Aug. 4-8

A religious drama, "The Gift of God," described in the press of the county as "The American Passion Play," will be shown for the second season in Portland August 4 to 8 at 8:30 p.m. on the campus of Reed College.

The Author as well as producer of the play is the Rev. Dr. Louis Harrison Kaub, who is Minister of Family Life of First Methodist Church, Portland.

It is sponsored by the Portland Methodist Ministers' association. The play is different from many similar productions in that the part of Christ is not played by a visible actor although Dr. Kaub says, "He is there!"

Dr. Ralph Walker of First Baptist Church, Portland, who saw the Oberammergau Passion Play in Europe and then saw the Portland production, declared that "Parts of it were superior to the European production."

The play is non-sectarian in purpose and is intended as "an adventure in worship" through drama, according to Dr. Kaub, who has seen it through twelve performances on the "old Oregon Trail" and now through the Portland performances.

The Reed College bowl will seat 12,000 persons and the people attend with their own seating equipment, chairs, cushions and blankets. Ample parking facilities are available.

The play is designed to "make vivid the leading scenes of the New Testament, from the birth of Christ to the resurrection," said Dr. Kaub.

The cast of 150 persons is now being trained under the direction of the coach, Robert H. Jackson, of the drama department of Grant High school and under Dr. Kaub. One hundred persons participate in the choir, under the direction of Jess S. Foster, who is president of the Portland Methodist Choir Directors' association.

The parts of the Three Wise Men are played by men with "strong solo voices" and the "angelic choir" provides a special musical emphasis of distinction, as required by Dr. Kaub's experienced judgement.

Dr. Roy H. Fedje has been named Director of the production and Mrs. C. H. Van Meter is the Executive Secretary with headquarters in the First Methodist Church, 12th and Taylor streets.

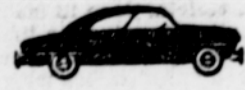

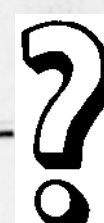

DUE TO CARELESSNESS. Over half of Oregon's 89 victims of fatal pedestrian accidents last year literally walked themselves to death, the state traffic safety division has reported.

an otherwise unsafe action on the part of the pedestrian was noted in 64 percent of 1951's fatal mishaps, the division said. Most common error bringing death to the walker was crossing a street between intersections, which killed 19 persons and injured 190.

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How Oregon Milk Control holds retail prices

up!



Under the present Oregon Milk Control Law the minimum retail price of the milk your child drinks is fixed by the Milk Administration. It is unlawful to sell milk below that fixed price.

The Milk Administrator prohibits passing on to you any savings from efficiency in wholesale distribution. Lower cash-and-carry store prices are also forbidden.

Thus many parents cannot afford all the milk their growing children need.

What Safeway Stands For

Safeway believes that the producer and consumer are harmed by milk regulations which fix prices of milk beyond the producer level.

For example, price fixing at the retail level tends to reduce competition, create monopolies, and discourage modern economies in processing, packaging, and retailing milk. As a result the price to the consumer is often higher than necessary resulting in reduced purchases, smaller consumption and disastrous milk surpluses.

When consumers pay cash for milk and carry it home from the store, they save the cost of home delivery and credit. Safeway believes the consumer is entitled to that saving.

It is Safeway policy neither to use milk as a "loss leader" nor to attempt to make an unwarranted profit on its sale.

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The questions and answers below show some other ways in which Oregon Milk Control affects YOU.

- Q. Does Milk Control hold prices up?
- A. YES. That is the purpose for which the law was designed. It sets floor prices, not ceiling prices.
- Q. Does Milk Control discourage competitive distribution of milk?
- A. YES. No one can enter the milk business if the Administrator says such new competition might disturb existing distributors.
- Q. Does Milk Control allow you a lower price when you carry milk home yourself?
- A. NO. You pay the higher costs of door-to-door delivery whether you use this service or not.
- Q. Does Milk Control limit the richness of milk?
- A. YES. The richness (butterfat content) of milk sold in each price range is limited by the rulings of the Milk Administrator.
- Q. Does the Oregon Milk Control Law regulate sanitary conditions?
- A. NO. It has absolutely nothing to do with the sanitation, health inspection, cleanliness, or the purity of milk.
- Q. Does Milk Control limit the supply of Grade A milk?
- A. YES. To sell Grade A milk for your use a farmer must first get permission from the Administrator. If he gets permission (and many do not), he is given a quota. If he produces more he must sell the surplus at a lower price for cheese or other factory uses.
