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Woods Power Equipment Operators Told To Exert Precautions to Stop Fires

Power saw operators and loggers with other power equipment have been urged by E. A. Danielson, Lane County Keep Oregon Green chairman, to exert every possible precaution this summer to stop logging fires.

The fire prevention leader said a good many blazes were caused last summer by the pure carelessness of power saw operators. Main cause of fires was filling power saws with gasoline in danger area and failure to keep saws cleaned of sawdust which causes fires.

Loggers in this county were urged to observe these simple rules of fire safety during the hot, dry summer months:

- Keep fire tools handy and in order.
- Keep pumps and tank trucks full and ready to go.
- Have a camp fire marshal named who is responsible for fire fighting and prevention around camp.
- Stop smoking except at lunch or protected areas in woods.
- Keep watchman at landings for safe period after work stops.
- Make regular check of all power equipment and eliminate any exhaust flame or other possible fire starter.
- Keep fire roads open and marked.

The Keep Oregon Green county chairman said a statewide drive is now being mounted to reduce all forest fires in the most aggressive campaign since the founding of the nationally famed fire prevention association eleven years ago.

Loggers will be singled out for special attention because of the large number of new workmen in the forests who are not yet conscious of the great danger from the carelessness with fire. Hunters, farmers who burn debris and pasture, picnickers, and smokers who flip cigarettes from moving cars will feel the force of public opinion as newspapers and radio join hands to stop wasteful destruction of our forests.
