Library Furnishes
Summer Readers
With New Books

For summer reading the City Library has many new volumes, fiction and non-fiction. Vacation time is often heavy reading time for many.

Among the more popular volumes is "Witness," the graphic and true story of an ex-Communist that testified against his associate in the famous Alger Hiss trial.

Another popular non-fiction book is the much publicized and serialized "I Led 3 Lives," also an actual story, this time of a man who rose in leadership in the Communist organization in and near Boston and nine years later, in April, 1949, appeared for the FBI against 11 top party leaders in a famous trial.

Lives With Eskimos
Other non-fiction volumes include the unusual "People of the Deer," by Mowat, story of a man who lived with the Eskimos.

Books of the sea have been popular recently. Two best ones are "The Sea Around Us," by Rachel L. Carson, which won the 1952 National Award for non-fiction. Also "The Living Tide," by N. J. Berrill.

For those interested in minerals as a hobby or as a serious study there are several new volumes. These include "Quartz Family Minerals," a handbook for the collector by H. C. Dakin, Frank L. Fleener and Ben Hur Wilson. Also "Igneous Minerals and Rocks," by Ernest E. Wahlstrom of the University of Colorado.

"Historical Geology" by Carl O. Dunbar of Yale University is the story of the world's surfaces from the beginning of time to the coming of man. Another interesting volume is "The Story of Gems" by Herbert P. Whitlock, curator of gems and minerals, of the American Museum of Natural History.

Fiction Highlights
Fiction highlights include "Windom's Way" by James Ramsay Ulman, the author of novels about man against nature. This time the story is of an American doctor serving in a remote part of South Asia.

"The Son of Adam Wyngate" by Mary O'Hara, author of the famous "My Friend Flicka," is another good book. This time the scene shifts to Brooklyn Heights in the socially brilliant early 1900's.

Other fiction numbers are "The Hidden Flower" by Pearl Buck, the story of the love and marriage of a Japanese girl and an American Naval officer after World War II. Also "Cloud on the Land" by Julia Davis, a Civil War story set in the South.

"The Neighbors" by Jane Abbott is also popular. For the lovers of mystery there is Earl Stanley Gardner's latest, "Moth-eaten."

Selective Service
Clarifies Status
Of 3-A Registrant

Oregon State Headquarters, Selective Service System, has called attention to the fact that many registrants appeared to have a misunderstanding as to when the advent of a child becomes a change in marital status and should be reported.

"It seems that most registrants have the idea that the change of marital status," said Col. Francis W. Mason, deputy state director, "doesn't occur, or need to be reported, until a child is born. In reality this change of marital status is effective as soon as it is definitely established that the registrant's wife is pregnant."

Col. Mason went on to explain that selective service regulations do not permit a local board to grant a 3-A classification if the registrant reports the pregnancy of his wife or the actual birth of a child for whom he is maintaining a home after the issue of his order to report for induction.
