The sensational pitching of newcomer Charles Willis gave the Githens-Legion Midget team a 5-1 victory over the Drain squad in a game there Tuesday night and gave the local boys high hopes for a close tilt with league leading Eugene here Friday night. The Eugene game, which will probably be the best one of the season in the state junior league, will get underway at 6:30 p.m. at Kelly field. Final league game of the season will be with Creswell there August 5. These three teams are in the top league spots.

The Drain defeat might have been worse, but the game was called after the fifth inning in order to make way for a Drain Black Sox game at the same field. Fresh Sensation Willis, a high school freshman who formerly lived here but has been in California for two years, struck out 8 of the 9 men to face him, allowing only one hit. He went into the game for the last three innings, relieving Ellsworth Sullivan was the catcher.

"The boy is quite sensational," according to Coach Bud Neal. Getting extra base hits for the Grove were Mitchell, the third baseman; Sullivan, catcher; and Ellsworth, pitcher and left fielder. Each got 2 for 3 times up. Drain's pitching staff consisted of Don Helsler, son of the Black Sox manager, who started, but was relieved in the second inning by Harris Wertz caught.

Rams-Cardinal Stars Prepare For Grid Tilt

PORTLAND (Special) — The greatest collection of football stars ever to appear on any gridiron in the Pacific Northwest will perform here Saturday night, August 30, when the Los Angeles Rams meet the Chicago Cardinals.

The Rams, world's professional champions, will present the mightiest offensive machine the game has ever known, led by the remarkable quarterbacking combination of Bob Waterfield and Norm Van Brocklin, former University of Oregon All-American.

The Cardinals, considerably strengthened by the acquisition of new players on the trading market and in the collegiate draft, will be under the guidance of a new coach, Joe Kuharich, who led San Francisco to an undefeated season last year.

In addition to Van Brocklin, two other Oregon alumni, Halfback Woodley Lewis and Guard Dick Daugherty, will appear in starting roles for the Rams. Three former Washington State college players also will play their first game in the Northwest since graduating from the Pullman institution. Jerry Williams, who has blossomed into one of the main offensive threats for the Rams in addition to holding down a regular defensive halfback position, will face two former teammates now playing for the Cardinals.

The Chicagoans are Fran Poltfoot, one of the best ends in the National Football League, and Don Paul, halfback.
