## TODAYS Menu

### New Flavor Twists Will Give These Meat Dishes A Lift

IT'S safe to say that the year ahead will see plenty of dishes such as pot roast and Swiss steak on the family dinner table. Two reasons—they are thrifty meat buys, and, when well prepared, they get a big hand from the family, especially from hard-working menfolk who need good, nourishing, sturdy fare.

The thing to do with good old stand-bys is never to get into a rut about preparing them. Every pot roast, each Swiss steak should be a brand new culinary adventure and treat. Such flavoring twists as a handful of mixed vegetables strewn over and around the meat; a delightful new gravy ingredient such as tomato paste, sour cream, canned onion soup, canned mushroom soup, ground ginger—these give new sparkle to tried and true favorites. Same thing goes for goulash.

### Variety of Ways

Most people think of Swiss steak as a dish of round steak cooked with tomatoes. Actually, this braised meat dish can be prepared a variety of ways. The browned meat can be cooked with the addition of water to which

flavorings and seasonings are added, such as herbs and spices. Imitating the thrifty French, we can add to the liquid a bouquet garni of parsley sprigs and celery tops tied in a bag with a bay leaf and mashed garlic clove.

If your menfolk like the flavor of dill—most of them do—here's a round steak and dill dish you and they may like.

Have 2 lbs. round steak cut 1/2-inch thick. Wipe meat with a damp cloth. Combine 3 c. soft bread crumbs, tsp. salt, 1/4 c. chopped onion and chopped dill pickle, 1/2 c. dill pickle juice and 1/2 c. melted butter. Spread this stuffing over the round steak and then roll up, fastening with skewers and cord. Place on rack in baking pan and lay strips of bacon over the top lengthwise to baste the meat. Bake at 325 F. for one hour.

Note that this meat roll is not braised, but is baked in an uncovered pan. Although round steak is usually braised, in this case the bacon keeps the meat moist. If bacon is omitted, the steak should be cooked in a covered pan with a small amount of added water.
