Two Week Course Will End Aug. 23

Forty-two officers and enlisted men of the 3rd battalion, 413th Infantry regiment, with headquarters in Eugene, are nearing the end of their second week of summer training at Fort Lewis, Wash., with other units of the famed 104th "Timberwolf" division.

The Eugene battalion, commanded by Lt. Col. Roy M. Morse, spent the first days of the army reserve training period in preliminary weapons instruction preparatory to range firing which came up this week. All men were to fire their basic weapons, and most of the troops were given an opportunity for familiarization firing with other basic infantry weapons.

Specially chartered buses brought the civilian-soldiers to Fort Lewis at the start of the July 20 through August 3 ORC summer camp session for the Oregon-Washington reserve division.

Officially Lt. Col. Morse is director of training for the 413th Infantry regiment which was selected as the demonstration team for a "Tank-Infantry Coordinated Attack" witnessed by all elements of the 104th Division. The 413th Regiment is comprised of units from Eugene, Beaverton, Salem and Portland.

Interviewed at Fort Lewis, Lt. Col. Morse said:

"Generally speaking, all officers and enlisted men who attend training at Fort Lewis are enthusiastic about the army's reserve program, and any person interested in associating himself with the reserve program and the protection of the United States should volunteer his services by joining this fine reserve unit."

TIDAL GROUP WILL MEET

The Army Engineers' Committee on Tidal Hydraulics will hold its thirteenth meeting in Portland August 5 to 8, according to C. F. Wicker of the Philadelphia district, Corps of Engineers, chairman of the group.

The group will visit points on the Columbia river and discuss problems of the river. A field trip to Bonneville dam is also scheduled. The first day the problems at Chehalis Point on Grays Harbor will be considered.

Local Man Fined For Drunk Driving

William C. McCain, 62 Madison, Cottage Grove, was fined \$250 and costs and sentenced to 60 days in county jail in Justice Court Monday on a charge of driving under the influence of alcohol. Judge Wells suspended the sentence and \$100 of the fine.

Complaint against McCain was signed by J. J. Dingle, Seattle, after a motorcycle driven by McCain struck Dingle's car as it was parked in front of the post office on Main street Sunday afternoon. Judge Wells said McCain had agreed to pay the \$104.50 damages on the car. Acting Chief of Police Charles Roberts, a witness to the accident, arrested McCain.

Conduct Charge

In another Justice Court case Monday James Graham, of Blackbutte route, was released on \$100 bail following a disorderly conduct charge placed against him in a complaint signed by Vic Worley. According to the complaint Graham called at the Worley home, also on Blackbutte route, Sunday and a fight ensued following an argument. Judge Wells said that Graham had been treated by a doctor for injuries sustained in the fight. No date has yet been set for the hearing.

FLIGHT TRAINING OPEN TO MARINE RESERVISTS

Applications are now being invited from inactive enlisted Marine reservists for assignment to flight training as Naval aviation cadets, Headquarters, 13th Marine Corps Reserve District in Seattle has announced.

Individuals who were formerly separated from the aviation cadet program due to quota restrictions, or who were released to inactive duty from the program at the end of the war, are also now eligible to apply provided they meet the requirements.

To be eligible, an applicant must be an American citizen and must have reached his 18th but not his 27th birthday at the time of applying. He must have completed at least two full academic years toward a degree at an accredited college.

All applicants must be unmarried and agree to remain unmarried until they win their wings and are commissioned.

LAST OF FOUR CIVIL WAR VETS DIES AT SPOKANE, WN., JULY 25

Israel Broadword, who took up arms at the age of 14 to fight in the Civil War, died Friday at the age of 105 at Spokane, Wash.

His death leaves only three living veterans of the Grand Army of the Republic.

Broadword responded to his country's call three times, enlisting in the 51st Missouri volunteer infantry at the age of 14, and later in the regular army when only 16. After the Civil War he rode with the 19th Kansas cavalry as a sergeant during the Sioux uprising.

After his 100th birthday he was still cutting firewood at the Samuels' farm where he lived with two bachelor sons.

He gave up smoking only a few months ago because of a "disinterest" in tobacco.

The three other known GAR survivors are: James A. Hard, 110, Rochester, N. Y.; William A. Magee, 105, Van Nuys, Calif.; and Albert Woolson, 105, Duluth, Minn.

Bright Markers Aid Traveling Motorist

"When going south, you should see red."

This isn't a lesson in losing your temper. It's the advice you might receive under an experiment being conducted in Washington, D. C. The American Automobile Association has informed the Oregon State Motor Association that an experiment is underway to aid motorists in finding their way through cities by using different colors for different directions.

At Washington Circle in the nation's capital drivers are somewhat startled to find the federal highway markers in brilliant colors: blue, green, yellow and red. All roads with yellow lead west; those marked in blue are heading in a northerly direction; while a red sign shows you're traveling south—that's the additional visual aid the motorist would receive under the plan.

Engineers Conduct Dredge Operation

The Portland District, Corps of Engineers, has again called attention of navigational craft personnel on the Willamette River to the activities of government dredges operating in these waters.

Colonel Thomas H. Lipscomb, Portland District Engineer, said the Army Engineers' pipeline dredge Luckiamute and bucket dredge Monticello are removing shoals from the channel in the Willamette River and are now operating between Albany and its dependence.

He said the work generally will progress downstream and is expected to be completed about labor day in the vicinity of Newberg, Oregon.

In order to hold the dredge and pipeline in the channel, it is necessary to have cables or line extending from the dredges to the shore, Colonel Lipscomb stated.
