Record Salmon Run Tallied on Umpqua

A strong come back in the depleted North Umpqua river spring chinook salmon run is shown in a tally of 4,409 adult salmon through July 15 at the game commission Winchester dam fish counting station.

The 1947 parent run for these five-year cycle salmon was only 2,994 fish. Last year a 49 percent increase over the parent run was noted, and on the basis of counts kept at the station since 1946 several hundred more salmon are expected through the Winchester dam fishway.

The previous counts were 1974 spring chinook salmon in 1946, 2994 in 1947, 2245 in 1948, 2109 in 1950, and 2940 in 1951.

A count of 2,650 summer steelhead by mid-July is also the largest on record for the Winchester station and indicates a big steelhead run before the end of the season.

Six marked spring chinook jack salmon released in the lower North Umpqua river in March 1951 as part of a game commission plant of 52,000 yearling salmon have been caught by anglers below Rock Creek hatchery.

Six Get Hits

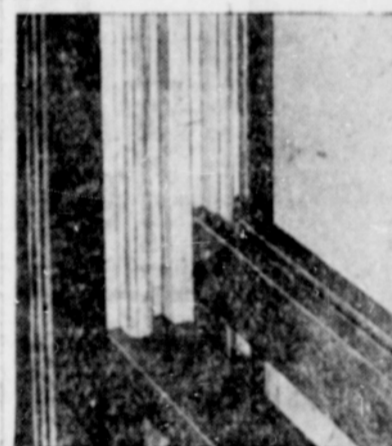

The big trouble with the Grove, Neal said, was its hitting. It had three chances, but muffed them, one in the second inning with two on base and no outs, another in the third with the bases loaded and no outs and another in the seventh with the bases loaded and two outs.

About 20 voters were out last Tuesday evening to hear Mrs. Lucille A. Klinge, county superintendent of schools, and A. L. Beck, schoolhouse planning consultant, discuss the need for added classrooms at Lorane elementary school.

At present the four upper grades are housed in the high school building, but this is very unsatisfactory as there is no place for them to play and both rooms used are much too small for adequate classrooms.

Because of the fire hazard of the seventh and eighth grade room, which is directly in front of the furnace, it was recently condemned by the state fire marshal. Since that time an outside door has been installed.

Shows Sketches

A representative from the architectural firm of Norris M. Gladis of Eugene was present to show preliminary sketches of two different solutions to the problem.

In scheme A the present gymnasium at the grade school would be converted into two new classrooms. This would be quite expensive because the only exposure is to the west and baffles would have to be provided to control the light from the west. A skylight which is also expensive and would cause the added expense of additional heat loss. Baffles would be needed here also, and a forced air ventilating system would be necessary for the back of the rooms.
