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## Annual Homecoming, Fellowship Held At Walker 'Little White Church on Hill'

The first Sunday of August at the "Little White Church on the Hill" will long be remembered by the many who attended the annual homecoming services there this year. The first homecoming was held in 1946 and for seven years folks have come from far and near to meet and remind others of incidents of long ago and to enjoy the fellowship of those newly met.

The morning services were of special interest, for the sermon topic was "Choosing the Right Companions," a very fitting subject for such a day, where companions chosen many years ago were able to meet in the same friendly spirit.

Special music in the morning was given by the Octogenarian Quartet, when they sang, "Going Down the Valley." This group is the oldest male quartet in the world and includes Frank I. Terpin, president and bass, who is 84; Rev. F. L. Cook, manager, baritone and who will be 87 August 27; George N. McLean, custodian second tenor and 83, and John H. Starr, secretary, first tenor, who is 82. They were accompanied by Mrs. S. E. Stevens.

A full fare of the basket dinner was spread under the trees following the service and at 2 p.m. the bell in the tower called everyone back into the church for a program of inspirational music and readings. The poem, "The Little White Church," which was written by Mrs. C. I. Kent of Creswell, and dedicated to the Walker Church on the first homecoming, was given by Mrs. Mabel Jackson as the opening number and was followed by the singing of the "Little Brown Church of the Willow," which is always, at Walker, transposed to the "Little White Church on the Hillside."

The invocation was given by LaVern Gomez, and then Carrie Lou Sherrill sang a "Song of Welcome." Another number entitled, "Little White Church," was sung by Jean Ellen Sherrill and "Neath the Old Olive Trees," was beautifully rendered in a trumpet and vocal duet by Mr. and Mrs. Al Griffen.

Two numbers by the Octogenarians included "Ever Will I Pray" and "The Old Wayside Cross," with the solo parts being given by Rev. Cook.

The story of the prodigal son was given by Mr. Alexander, preceding the reading of "Jamie" by Mrs. Alexander, and Mrs. Hugh Trunnell sang "Life's Lullaby." Mr. Casler presented a trombone solo of "Deep River," which was followed by a tenor solo by Mr. Allen Wheeler of "The Holy City" and an oft repeated request of "Oregon, Sweet Oregon."

Mrs. Kent played and sang, "Bless This House," and then the Octogenarians gave another beautiful number, "When They Ring The Golden Bells."

Rev. Cook exhibited a number of pictures of churches in Lane County in which the Lane County Council of Churches had participated in rebuilding, and he gave a short talk on the activities of each, which included Florence Church of Christ, Oakridge, Irving, Zion, Walden, Fall Creek, McKenzie Bridge, of which he is the pastor, and he also presented a picture of the Central Christian Church of Portland taken at the time when he was an assistant minister there and when Mrs. Jackson, then Mabel Mackie, was active there.

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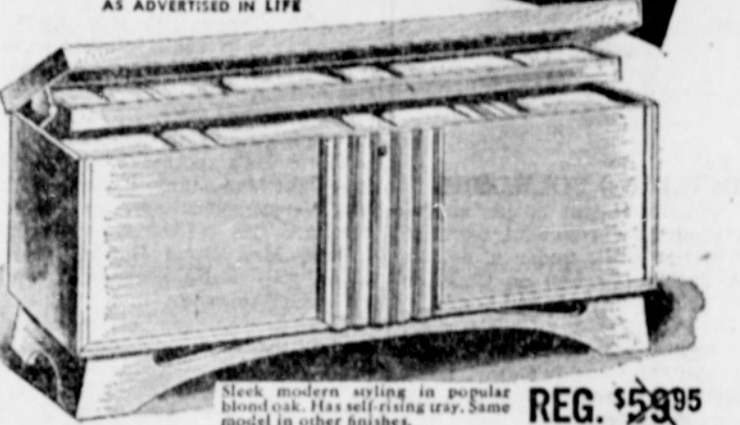
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
