Scientific Books Added to Library

The city library has an interesting new collection of scientific books made possible through the will of the late Ed Jenks.

Eight volumes have been purchased with more to come later. Mr. Jenks in his will left the library \$3,000. A bond was purchased, with the yearly interest designated to be spent on science books.

The new volumes include "Quartz Family Minerals," "Popular Gemology," "Story of Gems," "Historical Geology," "Eruptive Rocks," "Handbook of Nature Study," "Igneous Minerals and Rocks," and "Getting Acquainted with Minerals."

Button Book

The library also has other interesting volumes for the hobbyist or collector. For button collectors there is "The Complete Button Book," a comprehensive catalogue with more than 5,700 buttons illustrated.

For the interesting hobby of collecting of glassware there is "The ABC's of Old Glass" by Carl W. Drepper, with 700 illustrations.

For the avid reader who likes the latest books out, there is "A Bed for the Night," an interesting non-fiction book about hotels.

Girl's Diary

Also on the non-fiction best-selling list is "The Diary of a Young Girl" by Anne Frank, the autobiographical story of a girl and her family who hid in Amsterdam to escape being sent to a Nazi concentration camp. Here for the next two years Anne writes her most intimate thoughts. Although she was not allowed to live, she succeeded in leaving a record of hope for a better world.

For the historical reader is "Houses in Between" by Howard Spring, telling of nearly 100 years including the Victorian period in England, from 1854 through World War II and after.

Historical fiction number that is popular is "Silver Chalice" by Costain, the story of the Holy Grail.

"Gods, Graves and Scholars" by Ceram, the story of archaeology, is another good non-fiction number.

18 State Measures Before Voters on November Ballot

Following are the 18 state issues to appear on the ballot November 4, some of them hotly contested. Ten of them were referred by the 1951 legislature. They are listed below just briefly:

300-301—Constitutional amendment making Superintendent of Public Instruction appointive by Governor instead of elective, as suggested in the Holy Report.

302-303—Constitutional amendment repealing World War I veterans' bonus and loan amendment, which has been replaced by World War II legislation.

304-305—An act authorizing a domiciliary state hospital for the aged mentally ill in Multnomah county, to cost not more than \$3 million.

New Tax Base

306-307—Constitutional amendment authorizing the state or any county or municipality by a majority vote of the people to adopt a new tax base at a level not higher than any one of the last three years preceding. This changes but does not abolish the six percent limitation.

308-309—Constitutional amendment to make Korean veterans with 90 days active service eligible for the same state loan benefits as World War II veterans.

310-311—Constitutional amendment authorizing a joint legislative committee to function as a budget control agency between sessions of legislature.

312-313—Constitutional amendment starting and ending terms of state senators and representatives

on first Monday in January following election—to eliminate awkward situation caused by term of a retiring senator or representative ending on election day with several weeks before his successor is sworn in.

314-315—Constitutional amendment to insure proper title on amendatory acts.

316-317—An act limiting state property tax to not more than six mills for any fiscal year, effective July 1, 1953.

Truck Tax

318-319—Motor Carrier Highway Transportation Tax Act, increasing weight-mile taxes on big trucks and busses about 7½ percent, or \$2 million a year.

320-321—School District Reorganization Act providing a program to accelerate district consolidations as suggested by Holy Report.

322-323—Cigarette Stamp Tax Revenue Act imposing tax of one and one-half cents per pack, designed to raise \$6 million a year.

324-325—A bill to make Pacific Standard Time the official year-around time in Oregon.

326-327—Constitutional amendment to prohibit all race betting, including dogs and horses.

328-329—Constitutional amendment to permit sale of liquor by glass.

330-331—Constitutional amendment to limit all taxes or charges on motor vehicles for use of highways to registration fees and fuel taxes only.

332-333—A bill to revamp milk control and authorize administrator to permit sale of milk in stores at less than doorstep delivery prices.

334-335—Constitutional amendment for legislative reapportionment requiring legislature to act and authorizing Secretary of State to act if legislature fails. (Generally it favors population basis.)

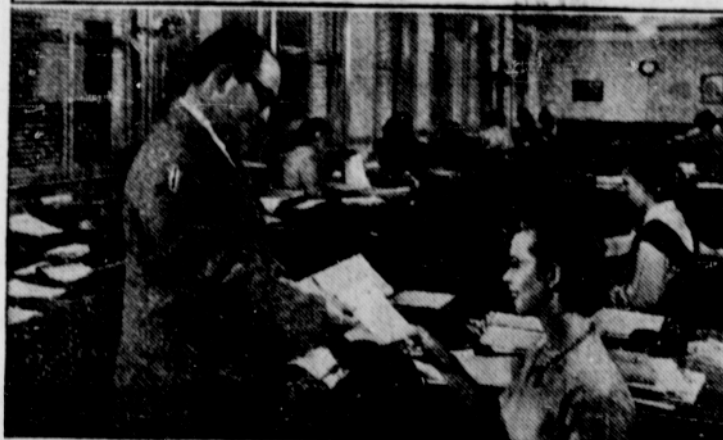
RIGHTS AND WICKED
