(Delayed) Voters rejected the bond issue for school improvements at the special election held Friday afternoon and evening. The vote was 54 No, 38 Yes. The bond issue was for \$22,500. Unless some other plan is quickly worked out so the school will meet standard requirements the district will have to look about \$20,000 a year state school support funds which will have to be met by additional taxes.

Archie McCrae, superintendent of schools at Lorane, has announced that the faculty has all been selected for the coming school year.

Serving with McCrae as high school teachers will be Mrs. Ruth Coleman and Hiram Hunt.

Mr. Harvey Moothart will be principal of the elementary school and teach fifth and sixth grades. Other grade school teachers will be Mrs. Patricia Castro, first grade; Mrs. Arnold Gates, second grade; Miss Elda Lowman, third grade; Mrs. Ruth Mitchell, fourth grade and Mr. Arnold Gates, who will teach seventh and eighth grades and also coach high school athletics.

High school and student body fees will be \$7. Lunch prices had to be increased due to other higher costs. They will be \$4 a month or \$1 a week. Registration will be on September 5 with classes starting on September 8.

All first and ninth grade students must have physical examinations before starting school. Blanks may be secured from Harold Foster at the Post Office.

New students who are not able to show proof of a previous physical examination will be required to have one.
