

# fashion firsts

The first fall fashions are in the local stores, with back to school wardrobes and the first fall outfits for the working girl in mind.

At PERRY'S are the new Joan Marie sweaters the teen crowd will like. In a short sleeved sweater ombre stripes of hunter's green, white and pale green or brown, heather and white, with scalloped turtle-neck collar. With cardigans to match in complementary plain colors. Also short sleeved ones in bright, canary yellow, cardigan to match. Or in bright red.

Chapter House sweater sets in heather grey, heather beige, purple, red, white, green. Also a nubby knit with short sleeves and a ribbed turtle-neck collar and waist band. In red, white and navy. Sleeveless turtle-neck sweaters, can be worn with blouses.

A nubby knit coat sweater by Chapter House or Rosa Lee, some with gayly embroidered wool flowers.

A must with your sweater this year, a gold or silver light weight snake belt, or a wide leather waist cincher with large medallion in center of the front.

Nice for school—the plaid shirt blouses in all colors by Palmday and Howard.

Your first fall dress—winter cotton. In darker plaids, gold and brown, green and coral, green and

yellow or tiny black and white check. In modified shirtwaist styles.

Portents of winter—the lovely fleece tweeds by Marce with milium linings for warmth plus lightness. One in sky blue and grey plaid tweed with deep armholes, natural sloping shoulder line, big, black plastic buttons down the front. Another in grey with clear plastic buttons, drop shoulder, deep cuffs.

Jantzen is in at THE SMART SHOP. Sweaters in crepe knit, khara-fleece and lovely cashmere. The cashmere slipovers with short sleeves and the cardigans to match, in dark brown, cherry red and hunters green. The budget crepe knits with the expensive cashmere neck and shoulder line in white, orchid, rose and olive green. The khara-fleece short sleeved sweaters also come this year with the cashmere tailoring—in mink, wine, navy.

The "Honeybun" is a modified turtle-neck this season, still with the three-quarter sleeve. A new look is in the "Dandy" with the V ribbed knit neck in pale blue, white.

Mix well with the turnabout knit skirts. Or with orlon and wool plaid skirts, whose secret is washability. In red, grey and white or green and beige plaid. Also in grey and yellow, grey and white. And a must this year—the wide belts—a beauty is the red with big square gold buckle.

By Patty Woodard of California—the lovely fall looking nylon tricort long sleeved blouses with stitched or tucked fronts, in plain white or red or white candy stripes.

By Koret of California—heather grey or beige daron blouses with three-quarter sleeves (wash like a dream).

Plaid and checked fleecy winter coats are in at THE NORRIS DRESS SHOP. Big sleeves and cuffs, deep underarms, the buttoned under the neck look, the flare are all there. In gold and black,

bright red, grey poodle. Some with black velvet trim, for instance a jacket.

Paula Dean and Juliette lovely fall pastel jerseys are in. Also lovely sheer wool crepes in one and two-piece styles. Nice is the grey two-piece with grey and white striped taffeta trim on the jacket.

By Boulevard—grey rayon flannel skirt with checked jacket.

For the teen-ager slubbed acetate and cotton in grey and green with a white knit turtle neck and tiny red bow trim. Checked rayon and acetate with black velvet trim on the V neck and forming a round bodice line.

Catching our eye was Johnnye Jr.'s middy dress in tan acetate and rayon with three quarter sleeves and brown and tan striped jersey jabot at the neck. Can be worn with or without the brown leather belt.

Sweaters, yes. In the teen-ager's delight—lamb's wool. In dark brown heather tan and heather grey, short sleeved slipovers and long sleeved cardigans.

And of course Ship N' Shore's little blouses—in white or gay plaids.

The new fall skirts are in at PENNEY'S—in winter slubbed cottons, in herringbone wool tweeds, or gay colored corduroys. Team with acetate rayon shirt blouses, short or long sleeved, in black, red, navy, brown or green.

Or with a wool jersey blouse. One we liked was the turtle-necked number with ribbed cuffs on the three quarter sleeves and at the waist. In black, red, dark coral, green, blue, gold. Also wool jersey blouses in short sleeves, shirtwaist style, in aqua, purple, red, teal and gold.

Mix all well with the corduroy jacket shirts, so good again this season. In gold, red, light coral, purple, brown, blue.

The first wool for back to school or at the office will be a plaid or tweed. Or perhaps a plaid corduroy would fit the bill. Or a corduroy jumper in navy, green or red.

Your first date dress for the new season—a grown-up satin but in a youthful style, in red, purple, green and black.

For warmer fall school days—the good, dark gingham.

And of course the traditional sweater—short sleeved cardigans with the new scalloped collar outlined in a darker color. In bright blue, dark green, white and purple. Or the new turtle-necks with long sleeves. The dressmaker look in sweaters—small round collar with short button opening down the front of a short sleeved sweater. This in pale blue, white and pink.

The first fall suit—rayon and acetate, checks or plaids. The coats—bulky tweed fleeces. Black and bright blue, with velvet jabot at neck. Grey with bright red, scarf attached. Purple and grey, or brown herringbone. All with the natural shoulder look, deeper sleeve, slightly flared.

The back-to-school corduroys at PETERSEN'S. By Toni Todd, in lavender, olive green and purple. Modified shirtwaist style with deeper V neck, flared skirt, three quarter sleeves.

A cord three-piece—canary yellow skirt and jerkin with small, black horizontal stripe. Also black cotton blouse with high collared neck, three quarter sleeves.

Vicky Vaughn's iridescent corduroy skirts, red or gold with a black look, jenkins in the same solid colors to match.

Embossed cottons in fall colors are nice for school. Green and pink with embossed flower trim outlined in white. Or a green one in a little girl style with small collar, buttons down the blouse front, full skirt.

Also in corduroy—a sport dress in teal blue or brown with sailor effect—two rows of small openings outlined in metal, with corduroy ties running through. Used as trim on the blouse and skirt.

Taffeta for dress—a two piece in green, blue and red with gold button trim. Or a purple one-piece watered taffeta with gold belt and buttons. Purple, pink, bright blue or black taffeta with silver splash design throughout.

For the sophisticate—a black faille suit with velvet collar and cuffs and trim around the buttons of the jacket and around a row of buttons on the full skirt.
