Spruce Budworm Mortality Is High

Approximately 98% of the spruce budworm caterpillars on 670,000 acres sprayed this year in the forests of Oregon and Washington were killed, according to U. S. Forest Service regional officials in Portland. Mortality was determined by field counts made by personnel of the Portland Forest Insect Laboratory, U. S. Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine.

Cooperating federal, state, and private agencies in this continuing project, the largest aerial spraying job ever undertaken in this country, are hopeful that the biggest part of the job is behind them. Although the amount of work still to be done is uncertain, present indications are that a relatively small quantity of work needs to be done in 1953.

Small Business Out In Army Contracts

Seattle—Small businesses in the Pacific Northwest are losing out on many excellent Army contracts because they fail to submit bids, according to J. H. Whiteleather, head of the Small Business Specialist Office for the Seattle Port of Embarkation and the Army Transportation Corps.

"Hundreds of jobs that could be handled by small local firms go to large firms, because small businesses do not bid on them," Whiteleather said.

The Seattle office, located in the Smith Tower Annex, is set up to see that the small businessman has equal opportunity in the procurement of defense contracts.

VETERANS SINCE KOREAN WAR MAY OBTAIN FORMS FOR MUSTERING-OUT PAY

Veterans of service since the start of the Korean conflict may now obtain forms locally on which to apply for mustering-out payments under the Veterans Readjustment Assistance Act of 1952, the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs has announced.

The state veterans' department has reproduced a supply of the application blanks and is distributing them to Oregon's county service officers. The department will also furnish them to veterans on request.

Mustering-out pay is provided in the new "GI bill" for personnel discharged from active duty in the Armed Forces since June 27, 1950, whether they had received mustering-out pay for World War II service or not. Applications are now being accepted by the various branches of the Armed Forces.
