of the paper—McFarland, Veatch, Cooley, Conner, Knox, Lurch, Hemmenway, Currin, Mosby, Shortridge, Hales, and on and on. Many of the same names remain on today's lists.

The first fair was held, according to McFarland, on the site of the McFarland today. It went on for six years until 1918 and then was discontinued until 1932, date of the start of our modern fairs.

"Fairs then were sponsored by the Cottage Grove Grange, and it had a membership of about 300 then," McFarland said.

McFarland says he is probably one of the oldest pioneers in this area, had lived on original homestead settled by his father in 1853. He lived there from 1858 until last year when homestead was sold to Virgil Kingsley, who in turn has sold it to Sam Veatch, a member of another old local pioneer family.

The fall of 1953 marks the centennial of the settling of this area by many pioneer families, descendants of whom still live here. The Sears clan, which settled here in 1852, had its centennial this summer.
