Special Service Sunday to Ordain And Install Pastor, Trinity Lutheran

Mr. Robert E. Kunz will be ordained and installed as pastor of Trinity Lutheran church, Seventh and Quincy, during a special service Sunday, August 31, at 3:30 p.m. Members and friends of Trinity Lutheran church are cordially invited to the service.

The Rev. E. D. Busch, pastor of Hope Lutheran church, 14th and B streets, Springfield, will perform the rite of ordination and installation, assisted by other Lutheran pastors of the surrounding cities. The sermon for this occasion will be given by Pastor Busch.

Following the ordination and installation service, an informal reception will be given for the new pastor and his wife to which the members and friends of the congregation are also invited.

Mr. Kunz accepted the call to serve as pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church shortly after his graduation in June from Concordia Seminary, Springfield, Ill., a Lutheran Theological School affiliated with the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod. He and his wife arrived by car from Springfield, Ill., early this past week.

Mr. Kunz was born in North Dakota, but spent most of his life in San Diego California. He served in the Army Air Corps as an air crew trainee. After attending

San Diego State College for almost a year, he decided to enter the ministry of the Lutheran Church. He enrolled at Concordia Theological Seminary in Springfield, Ill., in 1946. During his theological training, Mr. Kunz received some first-hand experience in the work of the ministry as a vicar in Columbia, West Columbia, and Camden, South Carolina under the supervision of John Nau, son of the famous Dr. Henry Nau of India Mission fame. Mr. Kunz was married in 1949. He graduated from Concordia Seminary in June of this year.

Mr. Kunz will assume the duties of his Lutheran parish immediately. He will conduct his first service at Trinity Lutheran Church, Seventh and Quincy, September 7, at 11 a.m. Sunday school will begin at 10 a.m.

During the regular morning hour worship on August 31, which is being held at 9 a.m., the guest speaker will be the Rev. Richard E. Gross, former pastor of Trinity Lutheran church, but now pastor of Calvary Lutheran church, Coos Bay, Ore., and of Grace Lutheran church, North Bend, Ore.

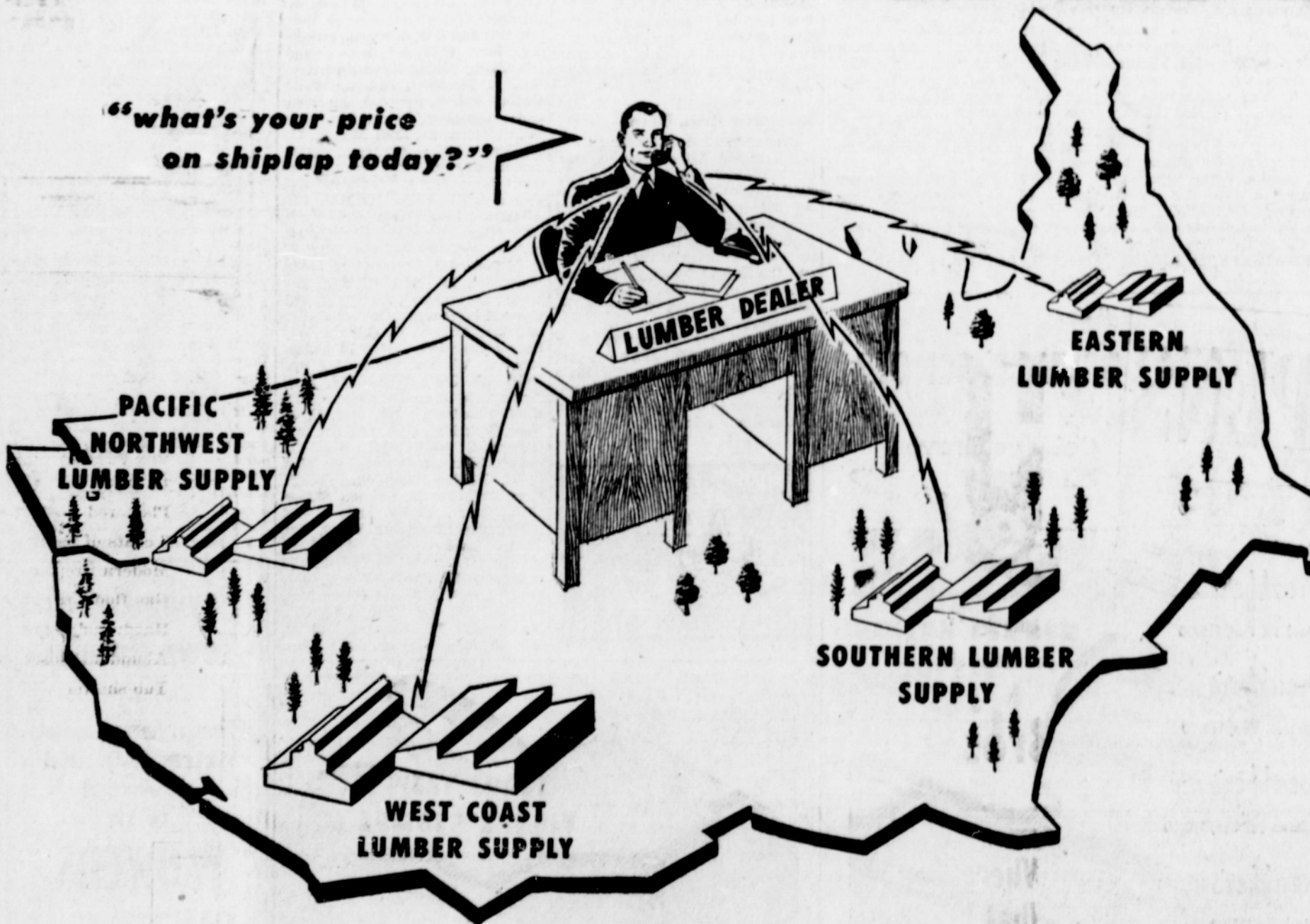
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
