McDole has a picture of a mare and colt exhibited. His brother, Bert, was holding the rope. First prize was given this mare and second prize to colt. At the same fair G. W. McFarland was awarded first ribbon on his colt. Ernest Sears remembers a picture which showed cattle exhibited by John Veatch in which may be seen Sybil Veatch and Max Sears as toddlers.

Wins Prizes
An interesting outgrowth of one of these fairs was the story of a sheaf of grain grown on the place of G. W. McFarland which got first place here, at the county fair in Eugene, at the state fair in Salem and at the World's Fair held in San Francisco in 1915. Mr. McFarland has a very large framed certificate which shows he got the latter prize as well as the bronze medal that came with it.

At one time the Cottage Grove Grange gave the businessmen and families a feed over the present Kelly drug store. Over 300 attended. Later the businessmen gave the grange a lunch at the park.

First Dairy Bulls
The registered Jersey bull grown on the J. L. Anderson farm, now owned by Dr. R. B. Merrick, as shown in the picture is held by Ernest Anderson. This was the first registered dairy bull raised in these parts, an old timer explained.

In the background of the picture stands John Cooley, great uncle of Frank, George and John White, and Jim McFarland, father of G. W., Frank and Warren McFarland of Cottage Grove. This Ernest Anderson in the picture has for many years been producing purebred Hereford cattle in Montana. He has won many prizes on top quality bulls.

As pioneers were telling the stories of fairs 40 years ago it was revealed that there were fairs here many years before that. In

a wheat field near the present city park there was a fair with a race track.

Races Held
George Small brought horses from eastern Oregon, and Bill Small, grandfather of Carl, brought horses from London to race with others there.

Now the "youngsters" of other years have just got to thinkin' and when they get their heads together it is hard to tell what other "fair" stories may be told. One thought brings up another.
