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A Deep Experience

A deep, religious experience that may never come in the same way again will be felt by ministers and laymen all over the Cottage Grove area September 30 when an observance will be held commemorating the publication of the new Bible in modern language.

Preparations for the big event, to be held simultaneously in 3,000 communities all over our vast land, have been going on for some time. The Ministerial association has laid the groundwork for the local celebration under the chairmanship of Rev. William Sutterlin of the Baptist church. A collection of rare old Bibles has been generously donated for a downtown window display by Rev. D. Hugh Peniston, a Bible scholar himself. The new Bibles are also in the display.

Many have asked, "But what do I want with a new Bible? I love the King James Version and see no need for a new one."

But actually the new, authorized version is older than the King James. It is new in language, but old in historic truths. Due to recent archaeological discoveries and study by scholars the new interpretations of old words and events have been brought to light. Also, when actually read, the Bible will seem to grow into new meaning, as modern language makes it easier to understand God's word.

Five fortunate people will receive Bibles at the celebration at the Methodist church. The names of these five will be kept secret until that night, also the reasons for the choice of these particular people to receive such a gift. Revelation of the names and reasons will be interesting.

According to Mr. Sutterlin the purposes of the Bible observance are (1) To deepen the religious life of our people and to prepare the way for a mighty revival of religion. (2) To encourage wider reading and study of the Bible. (3) To make communities more aware of their basic unity in the common heritage. (4) To inform citizens of the United States and Canada about the revised version. (5) To honor those who have given themselves tirelessly to the work of translation, and (6) to celebrate completion of the new version as a historical moment in the great tradition of translating the Bible into the people's language.

Ministers and laymen alike will sit side by side in the presence of God to experience a great moment in religious history. (JHG)

The Case of Senator Nixon

Whether or not the \$18,000 political contribution accepted by Sen. Richard Nixon will be a political issue in the remaining weeks of the campaign is to be determined, but the fact that Truman was a product of the Pendergast machine in 1948 seems to have made little difference. Most voters will probably dismiss the incident with the thought that possibly the senator was politically indiscreet in such an acceptance.

More important is the question of whether Senator Nixon might be influenced by any of the contributions, most of which were small, or feel a personal obligation toward any of the contributors. Starting from scratch and serving as a United States Senator, he has established a record for integrity, which cannot be challenged even by his enemies.

The case of Senator Nixon is not an isolated one. He faces the same problems of any other candidate, who attempts to campaign for a high office. To be elected a candidate must campaign to get acquainted with the voters. To campaign properly he must either be a man of means or accept political contributions from his party or his friends. Most of the candidates have managed to escape criticism for accepting this help; Senator Nixon did not. There is not an elective office from the state legislature up, where it is not comparatively easy for the candidate to spend more than the office pays him the first year. If we are to get competent men to run for office we must charge the high cost of campaigning to our system of elections or else draw the line and demand that any candidate be wealthy enough to support his own campaign.

Nixon's predicament may furnish the opposition with enough fireworks to turn the political spotlight away from corruption in Washington, which has been the major issue thus far, but even Governor Stevenson has refused to level any charges until he knows the details.

To most of us the big question is still whether we need a change in administration after 20 years or whether we like the present policies well enough to continue them.

Not Bad After Wraps Are Removed

In election years there have to be campaign issues and most of the time some factor of the so-called big business has to serve as a whipping boy. Perhaps you have heard of the "secret oil cartel." The federal trade commission unveiled its first rumor in March, which was supposed to be so shocking that the public could not be permitted to see it. After newspapers and public officials began clamoring to see the report, two government agencies insisted that the 900 page report be kept secret, because it might give aid to Russia. Later President Truman suppressed it for the good of the nation.

After the democratic convention, Senator Sparkman, vice presidential nominee asked that the report be released. The government then took the wraps off the document less about forty pages classified as secret. Newsmen were invited to hunt for the evil in the report, but the document did not live up to its previous advertisements. All the newsmen were said to have found could be found in any good book on economics. The main charge was that five American oil companies controlled 88 per cent of the world's oil output outside of Russia. One report says in all the report was about as secret as last year's newspapers.

Adding 10,000,000 acres per year to its land holdings during the period from the 1930's to 1950, the Federal government has acquired title to 435,146,726 acres—nearly one-fourth of the Continental United States.

Medical Group Sets 78th Annual Session

Dr. Blair Holcomb, Portland, president of the Oregon State Medical Society, has announced that the program for the Society's 78th annual session had been completed.

For the second consecutive year, he stated, the meeting is being held at the Portland Masnie temple. The dates are October 8-10, with a recreation day scheduled on October 11, which will feature the annual medical golf tournament and the Oregon-California football game.

This year's scientific program, Dr. Holcomb continued, will emphasize the care of two types of disability which are becoming increasingly important in the practice of medicine; namely, disorders resulting from advanced age and diseases caused by industrial processes.

Another important feature of the session is the annual banquet on the evening of Friday, October 10. On this occasion Dr. J. D. Houck of Roseburg and Dr. William Horsfall of Coos Bay will be honored as the two oldest Oregon physicians still in active practice.

RECREATION CONGRESS PLANS SEATTLE MEET

An unusual opportunity for recreation-minded Oregonians will be offered September 29 to October 3 when the Nation Recreation association Congress meets in Seattle, according to Miss Jessalene Mallalieu, extension recreation specialist at Oregon State college.

All lay and professional people interested in group recreation are invited to attend.

Miss Mallalieu, who is chairman of the planning committee for the 2-day Town and Country recreation section, September 29 and 30, says this is the first west coast meeting of the Congress in more than 20 years.

Some of the subjects to be covered include: organizing leaders; creative arts in town and country recreation; organizing town and country recreation; recreation for "midgets"; youths, young adults and oldsters; and a "swap shop" session for exchanging ideas and experiences.

Leadership training courses in dramatics, group singing, and games will be offered daily.

With a predicted fuel shortage overseas this winter, CARE \$10 coal packages will be made immediately available to such countries as Austria and West Germany. Gilbert B. Christian, Portland CARE chairman, has announced.

The parcels will contain more than 600 pounds of fuel. In Germany it will be in the form of briquettes. In Austria, half of it will be briquettes, half anthracite. Vienna and six other Austrian cities and West Germany, excepting Berlin, have been designated as areas in which there will be greatest need.
