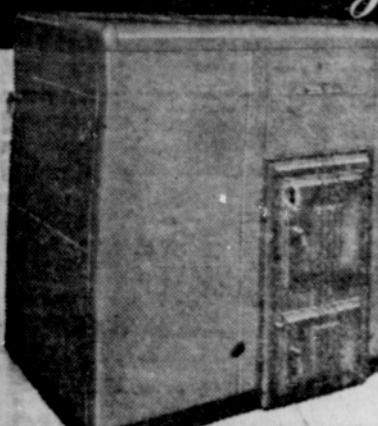

The Red Cross is asking all persons to make appointments, indicating when they write in the time they prefer. This is to eliminate time spent waiting in lines. More than 4,000 pints of blood have been collected in Eugene since the Korea incident made the need urgent, the Red Cross office said.

Anyone between 18 and 60 may give, with minors to bring signed parental consent.
