In this area on October 22 at Roseburg, 5,175,000 board feet in three tracts, will be offered, one by oral bids and two by sealed bids. The last O & C sale of the month will be at Eugene on October 23, where 11,035,000 board feet will be offered in five tracts, all by oral bids.

Women's Role in Legislative Affairs Stressed at BPW Conference Held Here

That women do play an important role in legislative affairs of their cities, state and nation was stressed at the annual southwest district fall conference of Business and Professional Women held Sunday in Cottage Grove.
A total of 79 women from all over the district attended the all-day session held at Harrison school.

Highlighting the meeting was a panel discussion on "Full Partnership in Legislative Affairs" moderated by Laura York of Klamath Falls, state first vice president. Other panel members were Harriett Neer, Myrtle Point; Hazel Hanna, Coquille; Faye Weber, Yoncalla; Marie Flack, Eugene and Muriel Peterson, Cottage Grove. Cora Pirtle, of Eugene, state public affairs chairman, summarized.

Mrs. Neer stressed the importance of letting each piece of legislation "stand on its own merits" rather than putting a price tag on them. She also said that "diffusion of information" was especially necessary on controversial issues.

Good Citizenship
Mrs. Hanna said all women should ask themselves the question, "Am I a good citizen?" She said this meant not just voting and paying taxes, but studying the issues. She said to avoid being a one-sided person, refusing to listen to the other side of an issue or to the other candidate, also to avoid the "cynical approach" of "What's the use?"

Mrs. Weber stressed the importance of foreign affairs, in knowing the customs of the countries in order to understand how their governments work.

Mrs. Flack stressed national legislation affecting working people including federal aid to education, the Taft-Hartley law, social security legislation revision, health insurance, housing, price and rent control, FEPC, and equal rights.

Mrs. Peterson talked on the importance of individuals and clubs writing to their congressmen with constructive criticisms and suggestions, not merely complaints.

Housewife Involved
In summarizing Mrs. Pirtle said, "Women's thinking has broadened in the last 10 years. Even the housewife is now involved in politics via the milk bill."
"It doesn't matter whether Ike or Stevenson get in, that is it makes no difference in the problems to be solved," she said. "The difference is in the very heart of the people."

Following the panel Mrs. Hilda Hightbe, Beaverton, state membership chairman, spoke on "Membership." Mrs. Hightbe also was introduced by the conference chairman, Margie Myers of Myrtle Point, as a mayoralty candidate in Beaverton.

Mrs. Hightbe stressed the national federation's theme, "The Ramparts We Build" and said that in order to build them clubs must create informed groups, organize more clubs and train more leaders.

Miss Fern Trull, of Grants Pass, state president, heard reports of presidents from Coos Bay, Coquille, Eugene, Junction City, Myrtle Point, North Bend, Reedsport, Gardiner, Springfield and Yoncalla, and Cottage Grove.

Club Projects
These reports included projects of the clubs, such as aid in erecting community buildings, carrying on drives, assisting in skywatches, providing books for libraries, clothes for the needy, providing scholarships and conducting public meetings, especially on legislation.

Miss Darl Herman, art teacher at Jefferson school in Cottage Grove, took the group on an informal tour of Europe in her talk following the dinner. Starting in England, she spoke on the austerity program that forced many workers to live on \$18 a week. Housing and food were the only cheap items, she said.

In Holland her student tour group found an intense hatred for the Germans, she said. And in Germany, itself, she found many students, former Hitler youth, in the western sector who said they were tired of war and would not fight their brothers in the east.

Europe Rebuilding
She commented on rebuilding, saying Marshall Plan aid was helping all countries in this respect, mentioning the apartment houses in Holland and the rebuilding of cities in Germany. Marshall Plan money also is going to other projects, such as the Po river dam program in Italy. Austria's tourist trade, on which she depends for a livelihood, is being aided also by the rebuilding of hotels, she said.

Miss Herman said she visited a friend and her family in Switzerland, the country she enjoyed most in her tour. This girl she had met at a U. S. Girl Scout camp. She said that the expression from her friend was that a United States of Europe was impossible if it meant a central government. However, the friend did say that militarily and economically some plan might be successful.

Other state officers and chairman attending the session were Leone Jensen, of Eugene, chairman of the state Chinese nursing scholarship fund; Peg Hatfield, of Lebanon, health and safety, and
