Library Receives
New Fall Volumes

Fall is one of the big book seasons, with readers looking forward to the new volumes. Cottage Grove library has recently received two of the more popular current best sellers, Edna Ferber's *Giant*, a story about Texas, and *The Lady and the Lumberjack*, by Oregon's Olive Barber.

Two other fiction numbers are *Shadow Marriage* by Kathleen Norris, and *Juniper Tree* by Faith Baldwin, the story of a father's struggle to overcome grief when his son is killed.

Among the more folksy and

homespun novels are *Little Benders*, by Joe Knox, a series of sketches about mountain people, and *Lemon Jelly Cake*, by Smith, about a family in Illinois in the early 1900s.

Vogeler's Experience

More serious works gaining attention are Robert A. Vogeler's *I Was Stalin's Prisoner*, and *Women in Prison*, by Joan H. Henry.

Other interesting and varied books include *Witchcraft*, by Hughes, a study of medieval and modern practices and superstitions, and Charles A. Beard's fine *Presidents in American History*, which should be interesting especially in a presidential election year.

For the collector is Scott's

stamp catalogue. Much talked about philanthropist J. C. Penney tells his story in *Fifty Years with the Golden Rule*. A new volume, purchased with funds left the library by the Ed Jenks Estate, is *Jewelry, Gem Cutting and Metalcraft*.

Holbrook Gifts

Stewart Holbrook gave the library 15 volumes, which just arrived and include several historical numbers and a *Who's Who of 1943*. Give *The Lady What She Wants*, a new volume about the fabulous *Marshall Field & Co.* store in Chicago, is included in this gift.

100,000TH BONUS CHECK
GOES TO PORTLAND MAN

The 100,000th Oregon bonus payment went in the mail last Thursday evening to Louie Yazzolino, ex-Navy Seabee, of Portland.

Thus the Department of Veterans' Affairs, administering agency, completed 100,000 bonus payments to Oregon World War II veterans just short of a year from the day it started processing applications, and less than four months from the date the department received the bonus bond funds.

The department warned that the deadline for applying is December 1, less than a month and half away.

Insurance Man Talks
On Fire Prevention

The Lions club last Thursday heard a talk by Robert J. Burke, Portland insurance agent, that stressed fire prevention points. The talk came during Fire Prevention Week celebrated nationally.

He said there were four important points to remember in preventing fires:

1. Matches and smoking cause the majority of fires.
2. Don't use makeshift plugs or fuses too small or too large.
3. Heating systems and dirty chimneys were other major fire causes.
4. Petroleum products, oil left in cans or dirty rags left around the garage or furnace also were dangerous.

He said that a good thing to do is to clean up basements and premises and rid them of inflammable materials.

Groups Join Fight
For Truck Tax Bill

Headed by such organizations as the Oregon State Grange, and the Association of Oregon Counties, a score of groups around the state have joined with the Good Roads Alliance in urging the public to vote 318 Yes and 331 No on the November ballot.

Measure 318 Yes is the measure which would approve the 1951 Legislature's action in revamping the taxes on trucks. Under the new rates heavy, high-mileage trucks would pay more for the use of our highways. This legislative action was referred by the truck operators, many from out of state.

A No vote on measure 331 will cancel a move by the same big truck operators to make it unlawful, by constitutional amendment, to apply any mileage tax in the state. Experts explain that this amendment would take much of

the tax burden off the big truck operators and shift it to the owner of the small truck and the private automobile.
