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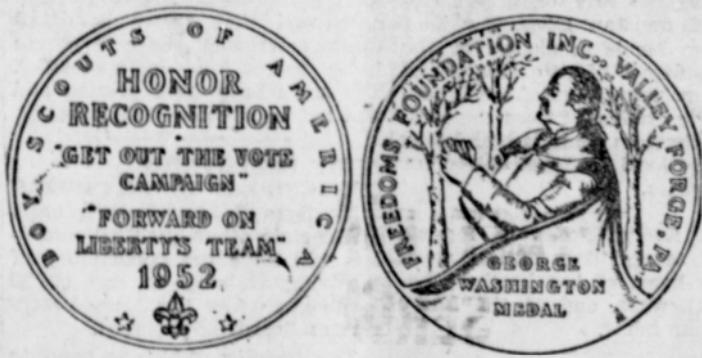

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## OSC Marks 85th Year of Service At Charter Day

Oregon State College — Four score and five years of service to the state and the nation will be marked at Oregon State College October 27 with traditional Charter Day observance.

At the same time, Dr. A. L. Strand will be completing his 10th year as the 10th president of Oregon's oldest state educational institution.

In a special article prepared for the October Stater, alumni magazine, Delmer Goode, director of publications, traces the history of OSC through the careers and contributions of its 10 leaders.

He writes that Oregon State college is the "lengthened shadow of no single man" but rather the result of the vision, character, leadership and labors of a series of outstanding educators combined with the support of an interested and informed Oregon citizenry.

While OSC was not designed as the official state college until 1868 by the legislature, its history extends back to 1856 when a community academy was first established in Corvallis.

The first president was Rev. William A. Finley who organized a scientific and a classical course leading to degrees and who established the first experimental farm and course in agriculture.

During the years of the second president, Benjamin Lee Arnold, came the first building on the present campus, Benton hall in 1889; start of the alumni association with 26 members in 1875; and the beginning of the popular and useful farm and home bulletin series issued by the college.

Other OSC presidents in order are John M. Bloss, H. B. Miller, Thomas M. Gatch, William Jasper Kerr, George W. Peavy, Frank L. Ballard, F. A. Gilfillan (acting) and President Strand. Throughout their years has come a steady growth in students, prestige and physical plant, Goode points out in his article.

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## BIOLOGICAL WARFARE ATTACKS EXPLAINED

What is biological warfare? Although many people talk about "germ warfare," the name they should use is biological warfare. It means attacking with:

1. living agents such as plant killing insects; 2. poisons or "toxins," such as those that come from bacteria; and 3. special kinds of chemicals, such as weed killers.

Biological attacks could be made by enemy forces or by secret agents. It's a special weapon for use against special targets. It couldn't kill or sicken every person in a large area.

The attacks could be aimed at people, animals, or food crops.

## TRAFFIC DEATHS MAY HIT ALL-TIME HIGH IN '53

If the current rate of traffic death increase continues for the remainder of the year, fatalities in the traffic lanes will mount to 39,500—the highest for any year since 1941, the Oregon State Motor Association has reported.

This increase, which compares with 37,300 in 1951, is attributable to the greater number of cars on the road and consequent greater accident exposure, the AAA club said. The mileage death rate has been dropping consistently over a long period of years which means that, mile for mile, Americans are driving more skillfully, cautiously and safely than ever before. For the first five months of this year the mileage rate was 6.7 deaths per 100 million vehicle-miles traveled, less than half the mileage death rate of 15 years ago.

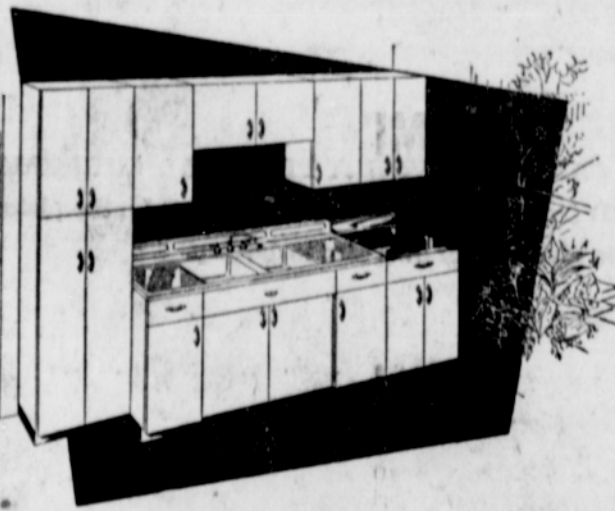
