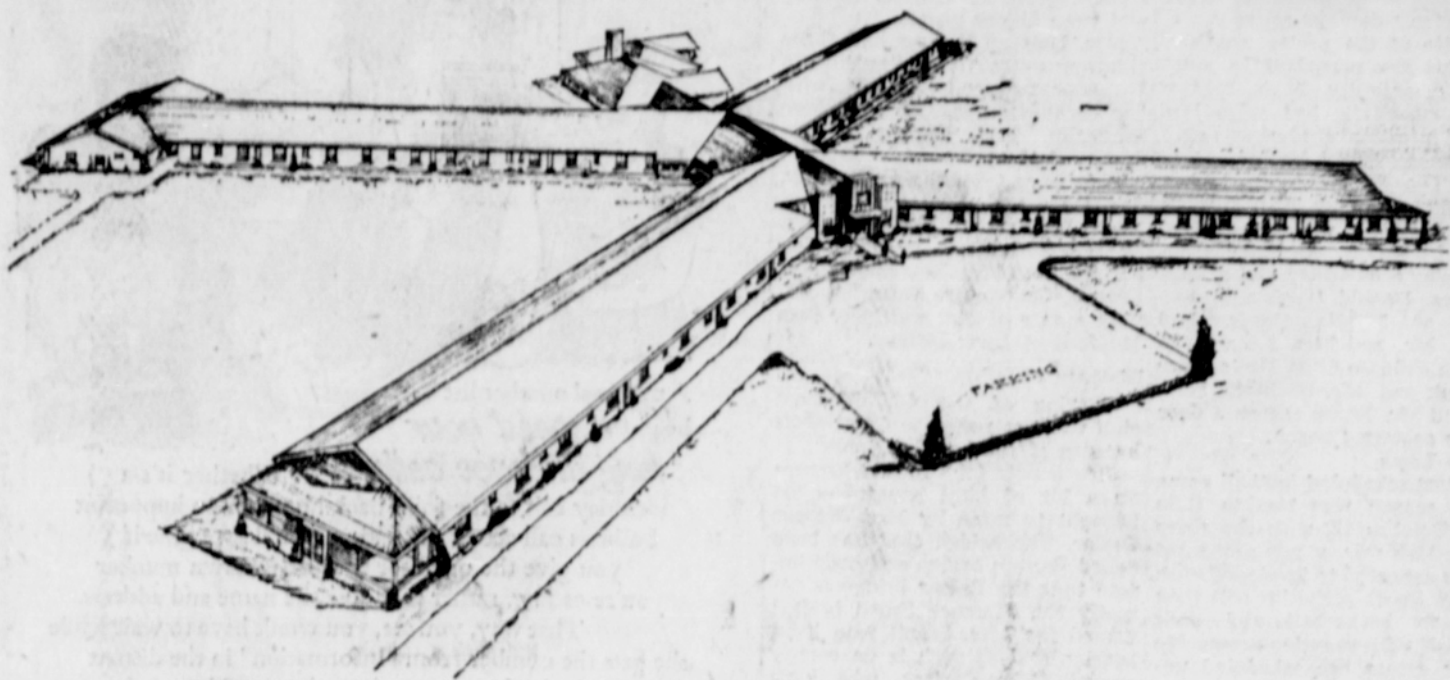

\$775,000 Nursing Home Up to Voters

After a two-month study by a citizens committee the county is asking the people on the November ballot for a \$775,000 county nursing home to house 250 welfare patients. The plan has been approved by Commissioners Lee Raish and Robert Maclay.

Phil Bartholomew, of Eugene, is chairman of the citizens committee. The group visited similar hospitals in Roseburg, Medford and Klamath Falls, some of which were built after disastrous fires in private homes. At the present time county welfare patients are cared for in private nursing homes, but only 120 beds are available, Maclay said.

The home will be built from a 29 mill tax levied for two years, with construction expected to begin about July, 1953 if the issue passes, the commissioner explained. Costs will probably be some under present costs of care in private institutions, he said.

The building will be modern and fireproof and will be constructed on a tract now owned by the county near the present county farm in Eugene.

Carnival Scheduled For November 14

Carnival time is coming! November 14 is the date of the largest money making event held in CG High. All money is made by students who sell tickets which are redeemable for food or games the night of the carnival.

Each ticket is worth ten cents and has a stub which is torn off at the time of the sale and saved to be put in the ballot box for the seller's class. All ballot boxes are put in the main hall with the name of each class on their box. One hundred points are given for each bunch of ten stubs. Stubs are counted each morning and the bonuses and totals are posted on the hall blackboard, with the exception of the last day, Friday, when the totals are kept secret until the coronation program that night.

The coronation program consists of the crowning ceremonies, entertainment, and a welcoming speech from the king. After the program guests move to the cafeteria, gym, play room and girls' locker room where booths are located. All decorations are put up and taken down through the P. E. and Health classes only.

November 3, the first home room meeting will be held for Carnival business. Three boys and three girls will be nominated for king and queen candidates from each class. Home room ticket chairmen and students to decorate ballot boxes will also be selected at this meeting.

Carnival booths will be selected during the second home room meeting November 4, with selections being turned in to the Dean of Girls. Booths will be assigned to home room as requests are made. The final king and queen candidate will be elected at this meeting, and one boy and girl will be appointed to sell tickets in the business district and in each residential district. Students who sell in the business district will be issued cards to show in the business houses. Plans for class activities should also be made at this home room meeting.

Ballot boxes will be put up November 6 with the class skits the same day during activity period. The skits will be given in the following order: junior, sophomore, freshmen, senior.

A plan is being drawn up for dividing the residential sections of

town into districts for Carnival sales. Classes may plan their own strategy, but only one group of representatives from any one class may visit a residence. Tickets may be sold by anyone on the streets down town or anywhere that is not a district. This method of selling tickets is planned in hopes of lessening complaints from townspeople and to encourage group and class activities for selling tickets.—Lions Roar

Saturday's program will begin with a roundtable led by University journalism professors on new ideas in publishing school newspapers and yearbooks followed by a "bull session" led by student executives of University publications, for the exchange of mutual problems and ideas among high school publications executives and staff members.—Lions Roar
