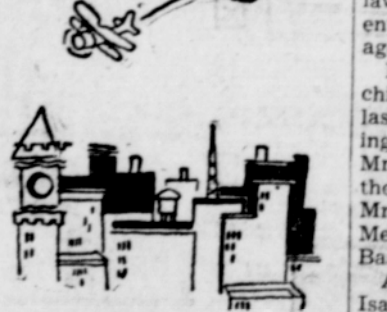

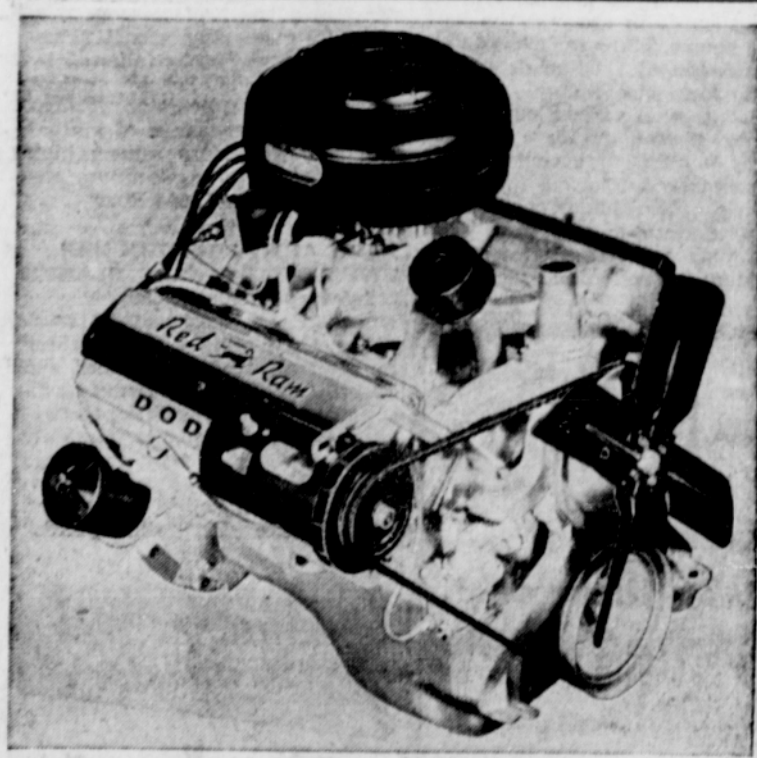

New V-8 Hood

There is more than just modern design to the medallion on the new 1953 Dodge V-Eight hood. Not only does it identify the car, but an integral part of the "V" and name plate assembly is the vent which scoops in cool air for the dual down draft carburetor. This air helps to improve the performance of the new 140-horsepower Red Ram engine.

Fueling Point Moved

Filling station attendants won't need to drag the hose over the rear deck of the 1953 Dodge. In order to enhance the appearance of the rear fender design, the fueling point was moved to the stern side of the car. Now it can be reached with hose from either side. The standard cap is painted to match body color. But a special-equipment stainless steel cap is available to balance the appearance of the back-up light on the right on the right side.

Space Saver Design

Ever have difficulty in opening your doors when angle parked in a tight space? The new 1953 Dodge has a space-saver door design which helps to lick this problem. This is accomplished by having the leading edges of both front and rear doors swing into the body opening. The doors also swing up when opened, providing better curb clearance.

Pull Type Handle

Women with packages or children in their arms will like the new pull-type door handle on the 1953 Dodge. Only one finger and one motion are required to open the doors from the outside.

New Pop Open Lid

Trunk lid on the 1953 Dodge has a push-button lock that causes the lid to pop open when pressed. It's counter-balanced for easy lifting and has special hinges that won't squeeze luggage. The lid also can be closed without locking. The carrying capacity has been increased by up to 13 cubic feet.

Glass Increased 7.7 Percent

Total glass area in the 1953 Dodge has been increased by 7.7 per cent and now totals 23.7 square feet. The new windshield also has a more uniform curvature which eliminates much of the distortion normally associated with curved windshields.

Push Type Latches

In order to provide a more nearly theft-proof front door and a more easily operated latch, the 1953 Dodge has its front door vent wing latches mounted so that they lock against the vertical division bar. They are push-type latches and easier to operate.
