## RECORD TROUT FOUNDAGE RELEASED THIS SEASON

Oregon's 14 game fish hatcheries produced for release in the 1952 trout season ending October 12 a record breaking 535,000 pounds of fish.

Game fish production last year reached 489,000 pounds, the highest weight previously recorded.

State Game Director P. W. Schneider explains that the game commission is placing emphasis on the increased weight represents larger fish and a better return to the state's 275,000 residents and 23,000 non-resident anglers.

## Shooting Grounds Opened for Public

The game commission will operate four public shooting grounds, Summer Lake, Malheur, Warner Valley, and Sauvie Island for hunters when the 70 day waterfowl season opens Friday noon, October 24.

A 6500 acre portion of the Summer Lake game management area in Lake county will be operated as a public shooting ground for the ninth consecutive year.

An 8000 acre tract on the Malheur migratory bird refuge reached via highway 78 south of Burns will be jointly operated as a public shooting ground by the game commission and the federal fish and wildlife service. This year Malheur lake has risen so that hunters will have to wade through water across private land to reach the shooting area.

## Finest Goose Area

In Warner valley east of Lakeview the game commission, through the cooperation of the Warner valley stock company, will operate for the third season a 7000 acre waterfowl shooting ground considered one of the finest goose areas in Oregon.

There are established camping sites at the Summer Lake, Malheur and Warner valley public shooting grounds. Both Malheur and Warner valley shooting grounds will close December 8 as freezing conditions usually force the birds out by that date.

A 4300 acre tract on the Sauvie island game management area near Portland will be opened to hunters, with one portion reserved for duck blinds. All blind hunting permits must be obtained as advanced reservations at the commission's Portland office. Reservations will not be taken, however, until water levels in the blind area rise considerably.

At the Sauvie island management area checking station permits will be sold on a first come first serve basis with hunter quotas determined by weather conditions and numbers of birds.

Placing second in the handicap division was Con Scarci of Cottage Grove, who was beat by 12-year-old Jackie Mattison. Palmer Johnson was in a three-way tie for fourth in the handicap division. Mattison and Scarci's scores for 36 holes were only one stroke apart, 65-67-131 and 68-64-132.

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## Lions Pull Game Out of Fire to Beat Roseburg 20 to 19

Friday night's game with Roseburg at Currin field was played like one from a story book as the Cottage Grove Lions pulled the game out of the fire in the second half to score 20 points after the Roseburg Indians dominated the first half to score 19 points. Three times the Indians copped the ball from the Lions within the 30 yard marker and scored each time. The first score was a gift from the Grovers when the Indians recovered on the Cottage Grove five yard line after a kick off. It took the Indians just ten plays to score the three TDs.

Friday's game looked like a repetition of the previous Friday with North Bend, but the Grovers were not easily discouraged for the Lions scored every time the team got possession of the ball in the second half, except a fumble and a lost ball on downs.

Roseburg kicked off at the start of the game and pounced on a loose ball on the Grove 5 yard line. Three plays later Danchock scored. After the second kick off the Lions pulled a "sleeper play," a 28-yard fling from Radway to Sloan, who galloped 11 yards more, which put the ball on the Roseburg 29. It was then that the Grove offense bogged down, losing the ball on the Roseburg 25.

After exchanging punts Grove took over on the 28, but here Larie intercepted a pass and drove down to the CG 18. Two plays later Thompson swung around right end, cut to his right and scampered 18 yards to pay dirt. The conversion was good and Roseburg led 13-0.

The Lions took the boot on their 31 and slowly pushed back the Indians to their 48, but were forced to kick. Helped by a 25 yard aerial Roseburg moved to Grove's 34. On the next play Sloan grabbed a wild pitchout and raced 67 yards to pay dirt, but the play was ruled dead before Sloan grabbed the ball.

An exchange of punts wasn't too profitable for CG as it put the Indians on Grove's 20. Thompson advanced to the Lion's 10, but two plays later was thrown back to the 18. Brandt then snagged an aerial in the end zone to make it 19-0 Roseburg.

Grove's first pass was intercepted on CG 46, but in four plays the Indians found themselves on their own 30.

Early in the second half three Grovers jumped on a fumble back on Roseburg's 36. Worked the ball to the 23 when Radway tossed one down the slot to Sloan who snagged it on the 12, stiff-armed Roseburg's safety on the 6 and plowed on for the TD.

After holding Roseburg to no gain Grove took over on the 39 and moved up to the Roseburg 46 on an unnecessary roughness penalty. From the 42 Treat grabbed Radway's pass on the 33 and did a tight rope act to the 20. Radway then flung one at Sloan, but it was grabbed by the Indian safety man on the 4. Mr. Sloan, standing inches away, didn't appreciate this so he wrestled the pigskin from the Indian and stumbled on to score. Treat bulled over for the conversion.

The Lions again pulled the steal act when they recovered the on-side kick one yard in Indian territory. Held for no gain CG booted to the Roseburg safety who was swamped on the 1. In four plays Roseburg moved up to the 42, then Treat intercepted an Indian pass on CG's 41 and raced up to the mid-field mark.

After moving down to the 46, Radway flung a pass in the flat to Treat, who snagged it beautifully and scampered on to the 4. Radway then bowled down to the 1 and Treat crossed for the score. Hayes charged over for the point that won the game.

Six ground sweeps and a 15 yard aerial put the Indians on the CG 22. Burge stopped the march by pulling down Roseburg's quarterback for a 15 yard loss, where the Lions took over on downs.

A ten yard gain by Radway followed by a 17 yard gallop by Treat put the Grovers on the Indian 42. With a minute and ten seconds to go Roseburg recovered a fumble on the Indian 42 and started to roll.

Cottage Grove fans went wild as Roseburg moved to the 47, the CG 38, the 28 and the 18, but the gun sounded as Hayes broke up an Indian pass in the end zone.

The whole Cottage Grove eleven deserves a pat on the back for that second half comeback. Radway, Treat and Sloan especially played good offensive ball, good defensive work being played by the whole Grove team.

The fliers' title was changed when Army Aviation expanded to include an increased variety of missions as well as larger and more powerful types of aircraft. Pilots have been required to receive instrument training for blind flying and instruction in twin-engined, multi-place aircraft since the Army's planes grew out of the "cub" category.
