

Lions Run Over Uni High 25-7

Cottage Grove ran over University High 25-7 in Eugene last Thursday, thus knocking the last Lane county "A" team from the unbeaten ranks.

Early in the game Uni HI looked like it might really go places when seat back Larry Payne went thru a hole in his own right guard for 54 yards and touchdown. But Max Murray's Lions quickly showed up the Eugene team by scoring a touchdown per period. The last Grove score came on a play which was actually completed after the final gun had sounded.

After the first Uni HI score and Dave Lockard's conversion the Lions took the next kickoff and moved 65 yards to even up the score. Quarterback Lowell Radway was the key man in the thrust. He passed 12 yards to Ken Sloan, another 25 to Dwight Treat and ran for 13 more himself.

Stewart Goes Over
Greg Stewart, reserve halfback and Jefferson star last year, punched the final yard on a fourth down situation. Marvin Hayes went across for the extra point.

After a second quarter Lions drive stalled on the Uni HI 21 due to a pass interception, Vic Fox fell on a Tiger fumble two plays later to set up the second score. Radway's 10-yard jump toss to Sloan put the ball on the eight, and three plays later Hayes carried it over from the two. Half time score was 13-7.

Play Thwarted
In the third quarter University seemed ready to tie it up but was thwarted when the Lions recovered a fumble on their own 12. In two plays the Grove had a tally that actually broke up the game. Treat ran around end to the 24. Radway pitched to end Jay Wilson who then lateraled to Hayes. The halfback tore down the sidelines on a 76-yard scoring play.

The final score came on the last play of the game with Radway again setting it up. He snared a Keith Harris' pass on his own 34 and outran Uni HI tacklers. Radway completed 6 out of 12 passes for a good 170 yards even in wet going. He had four interceptions.

OSC-Husky Tussle Is Set Saturday

CORVALLIS—Coach Kip Taylor's Oregon State football team chased spirals around the practice field all this week and will see more of the same next Saturday at Portland's Multnomah stadium when OSC hosts passing-master Don Heinrich and his University of Washington teammates. Saturday's kickoff is billed for 1:30 p.m.

It was highly obvious last Saturday at Pullman, Wash., that the Orangemen will need considerable defensive work against passes before stepping onto the same turf with Heinrich. Washington State's Bob Burkhardt tossed for substantial yardage against OSC as the Beavers "blew" a 20-6 third quarter lead into a 33-20 setback.

Meanwhile, Heinrich was having another outstanding day as he combined brilliant passing with clever strategy to lead his team to a 27-14 upset win off Stanford.

Salmon, Steelhead Catch Measure Told

The first measure of salmon and steelhead taken by sport fishermen in Oregon was revealed recently by State Game Director P. W. Schneider speaking in Seattle at the Pacific Marine Fisheries commission meeting.

Total number of salmon and steelhead caught between March 1, 1950 and February 28, 1951 in Oregon waters by sport fishermen was 94,100 fish. For every steelhead caught, two salmon were taken.

From March 1, 1951 to March 15, 1952 the Oregon sport fishery yielded 183,000 salmon and steelhead. Of this total 72,183 were steelhead and 111,817 were salmon, again almost two salmon to every steelhead caught.

A random sample survey of anglers who obtained salmon-steelhead cards for fish 20 inches or more in length was the basis for the study. The data gathered by Dr. H. J. Rayner, chief of the commission's fishery division, was submitted to Dr. Jerome Li of Oregon State college who analyzed the material.

One of the most revealing items in the studies was that many of the anglers caught nothing but the experts made catches with apparent ease to the effect that a lot of fish were taken by only a few anglers.

LOTS OF DIRT DUG UP ON STATE HIGHWAY JOBS

Since January this year the Highway commission has told the contracting boys to dig up a lot of dirt over the state and spread it out again in nice new highways. Just how big a pile may not have been visible to the mental eyes of the commissioners themselves, or their engineers or even the contractors who have been doing the digging, but it certainly bulks into quite a package when you bunch it up so you can get a mental glimpse at it.

From the January to the September meetings of the commission, inclusive, construction contracts were awarded which involved the excavation of approximately 16,554,650 cubic yards of rock and dirt, plus the quarrying and crushing of some 2,246,590 cubic yards of rock for surface topping.



Upland Game Bird Season Now Open

Upland game bird season opened state-wide at noon Friday, October 24, simultaneously with waterfowl season, the upland game bird bag included pheasant, quail, and Hungarian partridge.

West of the Cascade mountain summit the pheasant bag is 2 cocks per day or 4 during the season which closes November 2. East of the Cascade summit the bag is 3 pheasant cocks per day or 12 during the season which closes November 9.

A good hatch and survival of pheasants was experienced in North-eastern Oregon this summer in Umatilla, Union, and Baker counties and there is a high density of pheasants in the Vale-Ontario sector of Malheur county. Good pheasant hunting should also be had in the Columbia wheatlands, Willamette valley pheasant hunting will be fair with pheasant numbers at nearly the same level as the past two seasons.

Quail Areas
Quail in western Oregon may be hunted in Washington, Yamhill, Clackamas, Marion, Polk, Benton, Linn, Lane, Jackson, and Josephine counties through November 2 with a daily bag and season limit of 5 quail.

All eastern Oregon counties except Malheur and Hood River are open to quail shooting with a bag limit of 10 quail per day or 20 during the season. Open areas for Hungarian partridge are Baker, Union, Morrow, Wallawa, and Umatilla counties with a bag limit of 3 Huns per day or 9 in the season. Quail and Hungarian partridge season in eastern Oregon extends through November 9.

Highest quail densities are in southern and central Oregon. The Hungarian partridge continues to show a slow but steady comeback in eastern Oregon with numbers highest in areas opened to hunting.

Beneficiaries Fail To Apply for Bonus As Deadline Nears

Officials of the state Department of Veterans' Affairs have expressed concern over the fact that more than 1,000 widows, children and parents of deceased Oregon World War II veterans have neglected to apply for the bonus. The deadline is December 1, a little over a month away.

H. C. Saalfeld, bonus supervisor for the state veterans' department which administers the benefit, said an estimated 5,000 veterans who were bona fide residents for one year prior to their World War service have died in service or since discharge.

Only 3,978 Received
However bonus applications have been received from beneficiaries of only 3,978 of these deceased, and Saalfeld said the department is concerned lest many

of the remaining neglect to apply for the benefit before the deadline.

The bonus, he said, goes to the widow of a deceased Oregon veteran provided she has not remarried at any time prior to receipt of the bonus. If she has, then it goes to the deceased veteran's child or children. But the parents are entitled if the son's widow has remarried and he has no children, or if the son had never married. "Parents" means adoptive parents and those who stood in loco parentis, as well as the natural mother and father. Brothers and sisters are not entitled.

Survivors need not be living in Oregon to apply for the bonus.

Lloyd Powell, Oregon's sophomore left halfback, never played anything but six-man football until he joined the varsity as a freshman in 1951. He is a graduate of Triangle Lake high school.
