

## Ore. State Plans Homecoming on November 14-15

Oregon State College — The "good old days" will be relived at Oregon State college November 14 and 15 when alumni from throughout the Northwest join students in celebrating annual Homecoming.

Registration of returning alums

will begin Friday afternoon, November 14, and continue through Saturday.

Highlight of Friday night's Homecoming schedule is the colorful house sign competition sponsored by student living groups. Signs this year will follow the theme "Statens Mash Idaho Taters".

Also planned for Friday night are the traditional noise parade, which winds its way through downtown Corvallis; the giant freshman bonfire; and an all-campus talent show in the coliseum.

Saturday's program is built around the Homecoming football game with the University of Idaho. Kickoff time at Bell field is 1:30 p.m.

Before the game, alums will gather for their annual barbecue in the college armory and after the game will return there for coffee and donut jamboree.

Revived this year is the once-traditional Varsity "O" parade, a march of all former sports letter winners before the football game. Special recognition this year will go to members of the 1941 football team which won the Pacific Coast conference title and defeated Duke

in the "transplanted" Rose Bowl contest.

Coming in for special attention too will be the two new buildings — Withcombe hall for animal and dairy husbandry and the food technology building — which have been dedicated since last Homecoming and the new football stadium and wing of the home economics building which are under construction. Stadium excavation has now been completed and drainage and irrigation systems are being installed.

Miss Summie Chaisitthyudhapain of Siam spoke to the students of Lorne schools about her country on October 23.

She explained the customs of her country in former years and told of the changes that have more recently come about in dress and habits.

She displayed a hand woven royal purple silk skirt with a border of golden birds around the hem that was all hand woven. She also showed a blouse that was embroidered in native designs depicting a myth of her people.

One of the interesting facts she brought out was that formerly all people of lower caste and now servants of royalty must crawl on their knees and elbows when approaching their superiors, and must back away still in the same position when leaving.

She entertained the pupils by writing her name and a few other simple words in Siamese letters and spoke some Siamese for them.

She especially praised the use of DDT spray to help rid the land of mosquitoes and showed pictures of children whose bodies were badly malformed as the results of the malaria caused by mosquitoes before it was used.

Miss Chaisitthyudhapain had high praise for an American agricultural mission sent to her country in 1948 to teach her countrymen better methods of agriculture and said the standards of living have increased because of it.
