Pensacola, Fla.—Naval Aviation Cadet Charles R. Roner of the United States Navy took off and landed his SNJ "Texan" trainer six successive times recently aboard the USS Monterey, cruising in the Gulf of Mexico, to complete his aircraft carrier qualifications.

Cadet Roner, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Roner of Lorane route entered the Navy in June of 1950 and served as an enlisted man until his acceptance into the Naval Aviation Cadet program. He reported to Pensacola, Fla., in October of 1951 and has completed a stringent schedule in military, academic, physical and flight training.

From Pensacola he has been sent to advanced training. This will be a four month syllabus in combat type aircraft. Graduation from advanced training will win him the coveted Navy wings of gold.

Serving aboard the amphibious dock landing ship, USS Tortuga, in the Far East is Donald R. Angel, chief radioman, USN, of Cottage Grove. The Tortuga is a floating drydock, repairing all types of small boats and landing craft.

West AF Reservists Get Voluntary Call

Hamilton Air Force Base, Calif.—Openings for volunteer active duty for 895 West coast air force reserve officers has been announced by Major General Alfred A. Kessler Jr., Commanding General of Fourth Air Force.

This quota is part of the air force's current need for 4,838 reserve officer volunteers to fill manpower requirements during fiscal year ending June 30, 1953.

Fourth air force's quota calls for 336 pilots, 87 aircraft observers, and 472 non-rated officers for entry into active military service between December 1, 1952 and June 30, 1953.

COAST GUARD OCS CLASSES CONTINUED

The Coast Guard has announced that its officer candidate school will be continued beyond December 31, 1952, with classes convening through April, 1953. The convening date of the December 31 class has been changed to January 12, 1953.

A total of 25 civilians, selected monthly by a personnel review board, will be assigned to each class.

All candidates appointed to future classes will be required to serve a minimum period of 24 months subsequent to graduation from the Coast Guard's OCS. Civilian applicants are required to agree to this active duty requirement before appointment.
