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"OVER THE HILL" SERVICE GIVEN BY ARMY TAXIS

Passengers using the Army's Inter-Mountain Taxi Service in Korea don't need to worry about the meter reading or fumble for a tip when they go hill-riding with the Army's jeep jockeys.

The meterless taxis and tipless drivers providing this unique mountain-to-mountain service officially belong to the 95th Car Company which supplies passenger and messenger transportation for the Eighth Army's Tenth Corps Staff sections.

Staffed by two dozen Army hackies and wheeling 17 mountain-going jeeps, the Inter-Mountain Taxi Service rolled up more than 384,000 treacherous miles in all kinds of weather over dirt roads carved out of rugged Korean peaks during the past year.

Although the above are especially requested to take the class, it will also be open to the general public. An important part of the class will be teaching the new method of artificial respiration. Instead of the back pressure method formerly taught the arm lift method is now used. This is said to allow 500 percent more oxygen into the lungs. Life guards and other swimming program leaders are also urged to take this class.
