Safety Conference Scheduled Dec. 4-5

The Governor's fourth annual Industrial Safety conference will be held in the Masonic Temple, Portland, December 4-5, the State Industrial Accident commission has announced in Salem. The commission is sponsoring the conference with the cooperation of the Governor's Industrial Safety Advisory committee. This year's conference will be concerned with industrial safety only, the commission revealed.

The Conference will open at 10 a.m., Thursday, December 4, with a keynote address by Governor Douglas McKay. Portland Mayor Dorothy McCullough Lee will also speak. A feature of the opening session of the conference will be a round-table discussion by members of The Safety Team consisting of a panel of two representatives each from management and labor. Ray Carr, Portland advertiser, a representative for the National Safety Council, and a member of the Governor's Industrial Safety Advisory Committee, will moderate the discussion.

The three members of the State Industrial Accident Commission, Paul E. Gurske, T. Morris Dunne and L. O. Arens, will serve as co-chairmen of the conference.

Ten Sections
More than ninety persons from management and labor in industry will participate in the ten industrial safety sections which will include accident prevention methods, automotive maintenance and repair, heavy construction, building construction, food processing, logging, log loading, hauling and dumping, metal fabrication, sawmilling, plywood and miscellaneous woodworking and utilities. The sections will meet during the afternoon of Thursday, December 4, and during the morning session of December 5. Reports will be presented to the general assembly at the closing afternoon session, Friday, December 5.

The annual conference banquet will be held on Thursday evening with an outstanding safety expert as speaker. Also included will be a safety fashion show—a review of safety apparel and equipment.

Hall & Liston Insurance has opened a new office building on Main street, believed to be one of the most beautiful and modern in the country. Open house was held this week.

The front of the structure is thick plate glass with a large all-glass door. A small display case for the well known Hall & Liston accident picture cards has been erected as part of the large window. Built-in Desks
Walls and parts of the built-in circular desk area on the inside is of mahogany. Primavera, sometimes called white mahogany, a lighter wood from South America, makes an attractive contrast for the desk tops. Indirect lighting fixed in almost surrealist shaped cases in the ceiling provides an added touch to the modern scene. All of the furniture was especially designed and built on the job by the contractor, Carl Rich, as well as the built-in wooden cases for the office equipment, such as file cases.

The office is composed of one large room for taking care of customers at a renewal and current desk. Lloyd Liston and Charles Hall also have their desks in this room. In the rear are a private conference room, storeroom and restroom.

Another modern and attractive feature is the even electric heat. Centered metal knobs on the mahogany doors are another interesting accessory, as well as the floor outlets for the desk lamps. The entire old building was replaced, with the concrete walls the only part of the old one remaining in the new.

Employees of the firm enjoying the new offices include Mrs. Sophie Stilling, Mrs. Ida Isley and Mrs. Georgetta Funk. Adding to the attractiveness of their desks are built-in plant boxes.
