Sawlogs Steady Despite Lower Lumber Prices

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Sawlogs were steady in the Willamette Valley last week in spite of a drop in lumber prices.

A few mills in Lane county have closed because of the weak lumber market, but there is still enough demand to absorb the available log supply. There has been a lot of inquiry for Christmas trees from out-of-state buyers, but the market was not established. Other forest products were unchanged.

SAWLOGS: While some mills talked about cutting log prices, prices were about steady. No. 2 second-growth Douglas fir sawlogs brought \$38 to \$47 a thousand, mostly \$40 to \$42. No. 3's were \$31 to \$38. Camp-run logs ranged from \$35 to \$42, mostly \$40. Mixed second and old-growth logs sold up to \$45 a thousand. Eight-foot logs down to 6-inch diameter were \$16 to \$18 a cord, or \$36 to \$38 a thousand at valley mills. Mills in the foothills paid down to \$14 a cord, or \$30 a thousand.

Old-growth sawlogs ranged from \$35 to \$65 a thousand. Peeler logs sold as much as \$15 under ceilings for all grades at some northern valley points. Ceilings were \$80,

\$100, and \$110 in the northern valley and \$75, \$85 and \$100 in Lane county.

POLES AND PILING: There was a limited demand for poles down to 25 at Eugene and northern valley yards. The main demand was for poles 55 feet and longer. 55-foot barksies ranged from 28 to 34 cents a lineal foot, depending on diameter. Car stakes were in limited demand at some pole yards at 40 to 50 cents each.

PULPWOOD: Pulpwood demand continued to be very limited. Unpeeled hemlock, spruce, and true fir were \$15 to \$17 a cord. Unpeeled Douglas fir was \$15.

HARDWOODS: Alder, ash and

maple brought \$32.50 to \$34 a thousand in the Portland area. Alder was in good demand at Lebanon at \$35.

OTHER FOREST PRODUCTS: Christmas tree prices had not been established last week, but buyers are becoming active. Sword fern was 14 cents a bunch. Dry cascara bark was 12 cents a pound. Twenty-foot hop poles brought \$1.25 each at Independence.

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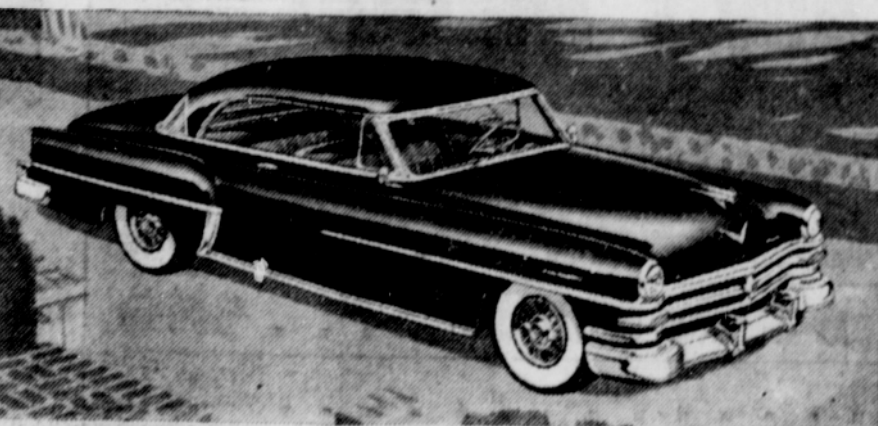
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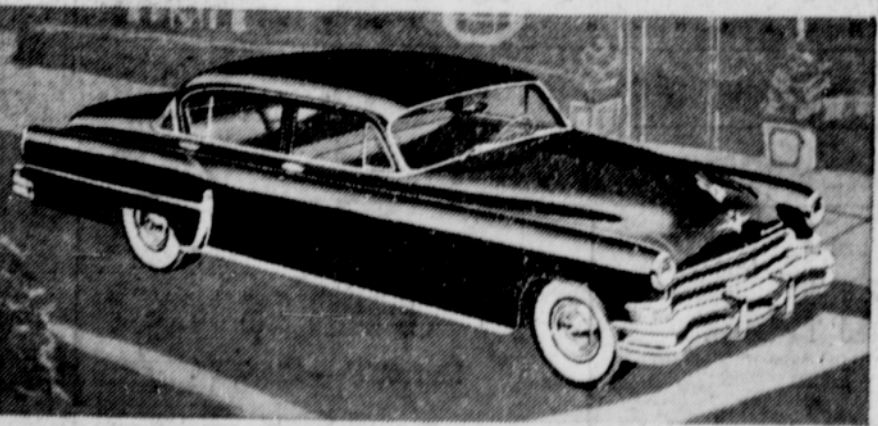
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
