

County To Share O&C Access Road Program Expense

Lane county will contribute its share, approximately \$300,000 toward a large access road program to salvage damaged timber being conducted by the Bureau of Land Management.

Most of the program will be in Douglas county, in the Smith River Burn area. Oregon's other 17 O&C counties also will contribute on a percentage basis. The provisions for withholding the total of \$2,750,000 for roads and administrative expenses for the venture was made in a special ap-

propriations bill passed by Congress last spring.

The money will not come directly from the counties but will be withheld from O&C timber receipts.

Some Work Done

Main reason for the vast program is that the large volume of blowdown, beetle and fire-killed timber is inaccessible. Some field and engineer work on roads has been done in the Smith River area already, the BLM said.

The BLM has said that private operators hauling from private land over the access roads would have to pay a road use fee.

It has been estimated that Lane county's share of the 1952-53 O&C timber sales may top the \$1,000,000 mark. It was about \$918,000 this past year.
