**CADET RONER REPORTS TO TEXAS AIRFIELD**  
Naval Cadet Charles R. Roner, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles R. Roner, Cottage Grove, reported to the U. S. Naval auxiliary air station, Cabaniss Field, Corpus Christi, Texas, recently for duty in advanced flight training.

Roner, a graduate of Union high school, entered the Navy in 1930. He received his primary and basic flight training at Pensacola, Fla., prior to reporting to Cabaniss Field. Cabaniss Field is one of the Navy's two advanced flight bases for student-carrier pilots. There they are taught to fly carrier-type aircraft such as the AD Skyraider (currently used by pilots of the Seventh Fleet in the Korean conflict) and the F6F Hellcat, Navy fighter planes. Carrier based aviation has been credited with 75 percent of all close air support for ground troops in the Korean theater.

**Municipal Officers Invited to Attend League Sessions**

**OSC DESIGNS PORTABLE LAMB BROODER FEEDER**  
A portable, heated lamb brooder that also provides feeding facilities for the ewe has been designed at the Oregon College experiment station. Building costs, scale-drawing plans, and advantages of the brooder are explained in new experiment station circular 515.

Titled "A Combination Lamb Brooder and Ewe Feeder," the circular was prepared by A. C. Warnick, animal husbandman; P. M. Rutland, shepherd; and L. W. Bonnicksen, agricultural engineer.

The authors point out that the brooder makes it possible for earlier lambing in cold areas. It can be set up in any sheltered area where there is adequate wiring for the number of light bulbs used as heating units.
