**SPEED PLUS SLICK ROADS CAUSES SKIDDING DANGER**

Speed plus slick road conditions equal skidding danger, the Oregon State Motor Association said recently in suggesting practical hints for safer fall and winter driving.

The best way to control a skid is to prevent its occurrence, so knowledge of what causes skids is the first step in avoiding them, the AAA-affiliated club said.

The most frequent causes of skids are: speeding up too suddenly or applying the brakes too hard, driving too fast on curves, swerving suddenly from a straight course, driving too fast while on rough roads, uneven brake adjustment on the four wheels, worn tires, and improperly inflated tires. However, excessive speed is probably the major cause of skidding, the AAA said.
