Lane, Douglas Projects Bids To Be Opened

The Oregon State Highway commission will hold its regular monthly meeting in Portland November 24 and 25. This meeting will mark the commencement of contracting projects to be financed cooperatively with the federal government under recently appropriated 1954 Federal-Aid funds; in line with a program of scheduling contracts through the winter months to permit accelerated and economical construction during the following construction season.

At this meeting bids will be received on 21 projects estimated to cost \$1,600,000. These projects call for the construction of 11 bridges and seven miles of grading and paving, 69,000 cubic yards crushed rock to be stockpiled for future highway use, two buildings, a traffic light installation, and a landscaping project. Projects in Lane and Douglas counties are:

Douglas Bridges
Under three separate contracts to be awarded the construction of nine bridges and grade separation structures are called for on sections of the Pacific Highway in Douglas county which are being graded and paved under going contracts.

(1) One bridge contract on the Anlauf-Elkhead road unit of the Divide-Rice Hill section calls for a 90-foot grade separation structure to carry the new Pacific highway over the Buck Creek county road, an 88-foot structure to carry the new highway over the Scotts Valley county road 2.8 miles further south, and a 42-foot bridge to carry a private service road over a channel change in Curtis Creek.

(2) Another bridge contract on the same unit of the relocated Pacific highway calls for a 154-foot structure to carry the Cox Creek county road over the new highway, a 70-foot bridge to carry the Cox Creek county road over Curtis Creek, a 100-foot bridge to carry the new Pacific highway over Curtis Creek, and a 130-foot bridge to carry the new highway over Elk Creek.

(3) The third bridge project in Douglas county is on the Oakland Junction-Deady unit of the Chenoweth Park-Deady section of the relocated Pacific highway where on a 100-foot grade separation structure is to be built to carry the new Pacific highway over the Elkton-Sutherland highway due west of Sutherland, and a 197-foot grade separation structure to be built at the junction of the new and old Pacific highway routes near Deady, south of Sutherland, to carry the new highway and a paralleling service road over a connection to the south leg of the Elkton-Sutherland highway.

McKenzie Job
In Lane county the route of the McKenzie highway through Springfield is proposed to be materially improved under a project for which bids will be received. From the Willamette river bridge easterly to 20th street, a new highway is to be built for east-bound traffic lying south of Main street one block to 5th street and varying from one to two blocks south to a point opposite 18th street where it swings northeasterly to join Main street at 20th.

The planned improvement calls for channelization at junction points, traffic control devices, construction of a complete storm sewer system, and general drainage improvement.

Grandma Allison Claimed by Death

Funeral services for Sally Enolia Allison, 90, affectionately known as "Grandma" to residents of Curtin, Anlauf, Divide, and Comstock will be held at Mills Mortuary at 1:30 p.m. Saturday, November 22, with Elder Wyman of Springfield officiating. Burial will be in the Comstock cemetery.

"Grandma" had lived in this area for the past 26 years and passed away at a local rest home Saturday, November 15. She received quite a bit of publicity when neighbors for miles gave donations in 1950 for the removal of cataracts from her eyes. Blindness had started in 1941 and in 1944 she became totally blind and twice she broke her left hip. The contributions received paid for her operation and once more she had her eyesight. It also furnished her with a folding wheel chair and electric blanket. And during her last days, the fund paid for a special nurse and funeral flowers.

The funeral has been delayed in the hopes of locating her son, Thomas Latta Allison, 59, who was last heard of two months ago at Independence and supposedly left there for Hood River. It had been his habit through the years to either come home or phone his mother on his birthday anniversary, which was October 18. This year he did not return and did not phone.

"Grandma" Allison was born Sally E. Taylor, June 24, 1862 in Montgomery county, Tenn., and was married in the same county to James A. Allison, who passed away December 3, 1904. She was the daughter of a Presbyterian minister and married a Methodist minister who was a circuit rider in New Mexico.

The death of her husband forced her to take up a sharecropper tobacco farm in Tennessee, where she supported her children for 16 years. Later she moved to LaGrande and to this vicinity 26 years ago. She was a member of the Southern Methodist church.

Surviving are one son, Thomas L. Allison, address unknown, and one daughter, Mrs. Helen Suiter of Curtin.

REGISTRATION CLOSES NOV. 24 ON SCHOOL FOR MILK SANITARIANS

Advance registration for the milk sanitarians short course on December 1, 2 and 3 under the joint auspices of the state department of agriculture and the state college will close November 24. Kenneth E. Carl, assistant chief of the department's division of food and dairies, has announced.

This is a new course required by law of every state and city milk inspector in Oregon. That means at least 30 men must attend.

Carl says the classes, which will be held in Withycombe Hall at Oregon State College, will be limited to 50 students.
