55-Year Resident Passed Away 4th

Frank Richard Plueard, a resident of Cottage Grove for 55 years, passed away at a hospital in Eugene Thursday, December 4, 1952, at the age of 81. He was born in Geneva, Oreg., September 28, 1871, the son of Basil and Elizabeth Plueard, early Oregon pioneers of French Prairie, near Champoeg, Oreg. Mr. Plueard was married to Clara Sanders in Geneva on November 7, 1893, and they came to Cottage Grove in 1898 where they had resided since. Mrs. Plueard passed away in 1947.

Mr. Plueard was employed by the Bohemia Lumber Co. for 25 years, and was a member of the Catholic church.
Survivors include four sons and three daughters: Virgil of Sutherlin, Lloyd of Cottage Grove, Alfred of Portland, Ralph, address unknown, Mrs. Gertrude Davis of Portland, Mrs. Elsie Lundbom and Mrs. Grace Queener, both of Cottage Grove; two brothers: Joe of Culp Creek and John of Sutherlin; two sisters: Mrs. Ofa Sanders of Springfield and Mrs. Anna Eustad of Olinda, Calif.; one half-sister, Mrs. Medora Jeffers of Veneta; 15 grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren.

Recitation of the Rosary was held at the Smith Funeral Chapel at 7 p.m. Monday, December 8, and funeral services were held at Our Lady of Perpetual Help Catholic church at 9 a.m. Tuesday, with Father Carl Mai officiating. Interment was in the IOOF cemetery.

INDEFINITE APPOINTMENTS OFFERED AIR RESERVISTS

Air Force Reserve officers, both on active and inactive duty, in Washington, Oreg., Montana and Idaho are being given the choice of remaining in the Air Forces Reserve indefinitely or resigning their commissions, Maj. Gen. Alfred K. Kessler, Jr., commanding general of Fourth Air Force, has disclosed.

Heretofore reserve officers have signed statements every five years, renewing their commissions. Now they may sign for indefinite appointments if they wish to remain in the service.

"For this headquarters to process applications within established deadlines, reservists are being requested to complete their questionnaires within 60 days after receipt," General Kessler stated, Economy Measure.

The new appointment has three important features: First—it is an Air Force economy measure, eliminating costly procedures formerly involved in the old five-year renewal plan; second—it helps stabilize the appointment of reservists, and, third—it provides the Air Force with a planning yardstick which shows how many officers it can count on for reserve activities.

"The new indefinite appointment has nothing to do with recall of inactive Air Force reservists to military service," General Kessler pointed out. "It is one of the provisions of the Armed Forces Reserve Act of 1952, designed to stabilize the reserve program of our national defense structure."

Christmas Angel Wings



Christmas is the cookie season and an especially good Christmas cookie is Angel Wings. This rich oatmeal cookie has a delicate crispness and a flavor that is "oh so good." They're pretty to serve too, with their lacy edges and decoration of nuts, citron and candied fruit. Try Angel Wings with a frosty fruit punch for elegant holiday entertaining.

Angel Wings

Makes 4 dozen cookies

1/2 cup sifted enriched flour
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup shortening, soft
2 eggs

1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 teaspoon almond extract (optional)
1 cup quick rolled oats, uncooked

Citron, candied cherries and chopped nuts

Sift together flour, sugar and salt into bowl. Add shortening, eggs and flavorings. Beat until smooth, about 2 minutes. Fold in rolled oats. Drop from a teaspoon onto greased cookie sheet, allowing about 2 inches between cookies. Flatten with a knife dipped in cold water. Decorate with pieces of citron, candied cherries or nuts. Bake in a moderate oven (375°F.) 10 to 12 minutes until cookies are golden brown around the edges. Remove from cookie sheet immediately.

Reserve Air Force Openings Named

HAMILTON AFB, CALIF.—Active duty openings for 62 west coast Volunteer Air Force Reserve pilots for all types of aircraft have been announced by Major General Alfred A. Kessler, Jr., Commanding General, Fourth Air Force.

Selected officers will be assigned to the 3700th Air Force Induction Wing, Lackland Air Force base, Texas, reporting January 19-22, 1953.

After ten days of processing at Lackland, the pilots will undergo eight weeks of refresher flight training at a civilian contract school prior to assignment to a major Air Force Command.

Officers requesting volunteer recall to active duty in the grade of Lieutenant must not have reached their 30th birthday. Those being recalled in grades from Captain through Lieutenant Colonel must not have reached their 36th birthday and must have logged at least 500 hours of flying time with a minimum of 250 hours as first pilot.

Reserve officers in the Fourth Air Force area interested in volunteer recall for flight duty may write direct to Commanding General, Fourth Air Force, Hamilton Air Force base, Hamilton, Calif., Attention PRS.
