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COOKERY CORNER Ox Joints for Budget Dinner

THE good housewife just refuses to snoot any cut of meat, however lowly. We know one good lady whose family just cheer when she serves up a dish of braised ox-joints. She cheers, too, because of the budget. The dish is served with hot buttered noodles, parleyed carrots, a dish of Bermuda onion rings and ripe olives, a head lettuce salad with a blue cheese dressing. For dessert, at this time of year, she tops off the meal with a strawberry-rhubarb pie.

To serve 4, have 2 oxtails cut in 2-inch lengths. Wash pieces of oxtail. Then broil for about 10 min., turning frequently until golden brown on all sides, about 10 min.

Meanwhile, saute one c. minced onion in 3 tbs. fat in large, covered kettle until tender. Add oxtail pieces and 2 c. hot water, one tbs. vinegar, 1/2 tsp. minced garlic, 2 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. pepper and 1/2 tsp. granulated sugar. Cover, simmer 3 1/2 hours, or until meat is tender, replenishing water with boiling water, if necessary. Remove meat to hot platter,

and keep it warm. Thicken gravy using 2 tbs. flour blended with 3 tbs. cold water to each c. of liquid. Pour over or serve with meat and hot noodles.

Making the Pie

To prepare the pie, combine one c. sugar, 1/4 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. nutmeg, 2 tbs. quick-cooking tapioca, 1/4 c. orange juice and 3 c. cut rhubarb. Place in 9-inch pan lined with pastry. Top with one c. strawberries and dot with tbs. butter. Arrange whole pastry top or lattice covering. Bake in hot oven (450 F.) for 10 min., then in 350 F. for 30 min.

Finally, there's just room for a repeat on the recipe for crunch chocolate bars, for which several requests are at hand. Melt 1/2 lb. semi-sweet chocolate, or sweet milk chocolate over hot water; add one c. bran cereal. Stir until blended. Pack into a loaf pan that has been lined with wax paper. Allow to set until chocolate hardens; cut into bars. Yield: 4 bars (4 1/4 inches—4 1/2 x 1 1/2-inch pan). The bars are grand, kept in refrigerator for emergency refreshments if they get a chance to stay there long enough!

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
