Christmas Tree Cutting in Full Swing Over Area

Oregon State College — Christmas tree cutting was in full swing in western Oregon last week.

Prices for both cut trees and stumps varied widely, but averaged about the same as last year. Douglas fir sawlogs and other forest products were unchanged.

SAWLOGS: Willamette Valley mills bought No. 2 second-growth sawlogs at \$38 to \$47 a thousand, mostly \$38 to \$40. No. 3's were \$31 to \$38. Second-growth camp run logs ranged from \$35 to \$42 a thousand, mostly \$38 to \$40. Mixed second and old-growth brought up to \$45. Eight foot logs down to 6 inch diameter were \$16 to \$18 a cord, or \$36 to \$38 a thousand at valley mills. Mills in the foothills paid down to \$14 a cord, or \$30 a thousand.

CHRISTMAS TREES: Christmas tree stumpage sales ran all the way from 10 cents to 40 cents a tree. The average price was around 15 to 20 cents, and prices depended largely on accessibility, quality and average size. A few stumpage sales were made on the basis of 5 cents a lineal foot.

Cut trees at the roadside ranged from 5 to 10 cents a lineal foot. Most Portland sales yards paid 50 to 90 cents a tree, delivered, depending on size and quality.

POLES AND PILING: Long poles were in good demand at most pole yards. 55 foot barksies ranged from 28 to 34 cents a lineal foot, depending on diameter, at Willamette Valley yards. Car stakes were 40 to 50 cents each.

HARDWOODS: Alder, ash and maple brought \$32.50 to \$34 a thousand in the Portland area. Alder was in good demand at Lebanon at \$35.

OTHER FOREST PRODUCTS: Cedar hop poles were in good demand at Independence at \$2 each. Fir hop poles were slow at \$1.25. Sword fern was 14 cents a bunch. Dry cascara bark was 12 cents a pound.

General to Speak At Basin Meeting

A review of the past year's progress in harnessing the rivers of the Willamette basin and a look to the future will be presented at the annual meeting of the Willamette Basin Project committee in Salem, Wednesday, December 17. Elmo Chase, Eugene, chairman of the committee, said the featured speaker of the meeting will be Brig. Gen. C. H. Chorpene, assistant chief of engineers for civil works from Washington, D. C. He will address a noon luncheon at the Senator hotel.

All other sessions will be in Room 309 of the State Capitol, starting at 9:30 a.m.

Congressman Homer Angell and Oregon's Governor Douglas McKay, who will become Secretary of the Interior under President-elect Eisenhower, are other scheduled speakers.

Progress Report

In Salem, Ivan E. Oakes, executive secretary for the Willamette Basin Commission, observed that Detroit and Big Cliff dams will be completed in 1953. Look-out Point Dam and the Dexter regulating dam, other major projects are scheduled for completion in 1954.

Oakes said the only other dam which has any funds appropriated for planning is Hills Creek on the Middle Fork of the Willamette river. The project committee, which acts in an advisory capacity, is working toward achieving funds for Cougar dam in the McKenzie river, and Green Peter dam on the South Santiam river, he added.

Oakes indicated that "the second phase of our project—namely irrigation—must now be emphasized."

Noting that last summer's crop season "was dry and short of irrigation water," he observed that 180,000 acre feet of water was stored in Fern Ridge, Cottage Grove and Dorena reservoirs, all in Lane county. Some of this water was available for irrigation.

By next year, he said there will be added storage from Detroit reservoir of about 150,000 acre feet, which will make total storage of water in excess of 300,000 acre feet.
