CG RESERVE OPENINGS

CITED IN FOUR CITIES

The Coast Guard has made pub-
lic the present manpower status
of its four reserve units that train
their men in port security work
and vessel operation in Seattle,
Portland and Spokane.

Although all Coast Guard units
in the three cities are allowed 410
officers and men, the Coast Guard
is now short of that figures with
openings being held for men in
Portland, Spokane, and in the two
units in Seattle.

51 as yet unfilled openings for of-
ficers and enlisted men.

Producers Bypass Lower Milk Prices In Favor of Fat

Lou Hartwig of the Grove Maid
Dairy, who attended a meeting of
milk distributors in Eugene Mon-
day night, said that the group de-
cided to raise the butterfat con-
tent of milk from 3.5 to 4 percent
rather than take the one-cent
price cut per quart.

Customers requesting richer
milk and inability to operate at a
price cut were reasons given.

A revision of prices that can le-
gally be charged for milk in 22
Oregon counties went into effect
December 16 following an an-
nouncement Saturday by the Ore-
gon State Board of Agriculture
when a series of orders was issued
under authority of the Oregon
Milk Marketing Act.

The new price schedule enables
consumers in most of the counties
affected to buy milk containing 4
percent butterfat without paying
any more than they have paid
heretofore for milk of lower but-
terfat content, according to Fred
Cockell, chairman of the State
Board of Agriculture.

In Lane county milk with 3.5%
butterfat will cost retail a cent
less, or 23 cents a quart instead of
24. That with 4% butterfat will be
24 cents. Wholesale prices are 2
cents higher. Producer prices per
100 lbs. of 4% will be lowered
from \$6.76 to \$6.72.

Varies by County
If public preference is for milk
of lower or higher butterfat con-
tent than 4 percent prices for such
other grades of milk will vary ac-
cording to the amount of butter-
fat contained in the products, the
agricultural board chairman
points out. In six counties the
price of milk containing 3.5 per-
cent butterfat was reduced 1/2
cent a quart; in four counties the
reduction was one cent a quart;
while in one county the new mini-
mum price for 3.5 percent milk
will be two cents a quart less than
has been charged for "standard"
milk now being distributed in the
area.

Prices distributors will be re-
quired to pay producers for milk
used in the bottle trade remained
unchanged in the new orders ex-
cept for a slight increase in one
central Oregon area and slight
decreases in seven counties.
