Geography Class Is Set at Drain

James C. Stovall, assistant professor of geography at the University of Oregon, will instruct a class in Introductory Geography at the Drain grade school Wednesday evenings beginning January 7, Dr. John F. Cramer, dean of the General Extension Division of the state system of higher education, has announced.

The class will offer three quarter hours of college credit. However, all adults are welcome to enroll whether or not they wish credit, Dr. Cramer said. Fees are \$18. The class will meet for 11 weeks.

Civil Service Job Of Postal Clerk Open in Oregon

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for substitute postal transportation clerk for filling positions in the following states: Alabama, Arizona, California, Colorado, Georgia, Idaho, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, North Carolina, North Dakota, Ohio, Oregon, South Dakota, Tennessee, Utah, Virginia, Washington, West Virginia, Wisconsin, Wyoming. Applicants must be bona fide residents of the state for which they apply. The jobs pay \$1,711½ an hour.

A written test is required. Age limits are from 18 to 50 years (waived for persons entitled to veterans preference). Men only are desired.

Full information and application forms may be obtained from the commission's local secretary, L. A. Naish at the Cottage Grove post office or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C. Applications must be received in the Commission's Washington office not later than January 22, 1953.

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State Plans Fifth Spring Spraying In Battle Against Dreaded Budworm

Salem—This spring the state forestry department will start the fifth consecutive year of its battle to destroy the dreaded spruce budworm, forest insect which in 1944 threatened destruction of 12 billion board feet of Oregon's finest fir timber.

To continue this fight, John B. Woods, Jr., assistant state forester, said that invitations to bid on the aerial spray control job would be issued by the state forestry departments early in January. The bids will include 275,000 acres of infested lands which require treatment. The areas are located in Northeastern Oregon between Ukiah and La Grande. Woods stated the bids will cover the state portion of the over-all spruce budworm control program as outlined by the Northwest Forest Pest Action Committee. Remaining 225,000 acres of budworm infested timberlands in the state will be treated by the U. S. Forest Service.

Woods reported that four aerial spraying projects since 1949 have demonstrated that the aggressive budworm can be effectively and economically controlled. In 1952, 375,000 acres were sprayed with DDT at a cost of \$1.03 per acre. The forester said that the control programs, carried on cooperatively by the federal government, the state of Oregon and private forest land owners, have prevented widespread destruction in our fir forests. Inspection of the treated areas revealed that the DDT spray killed over 98 percent of the insects.

Limited Time

The forestry department cautioned interested aircraft spray contractors who planned to submit bids, that the spruce budworm may be destroyed by the DDT for a limited period of only two or three weeks each spring. To meet this rigid time requirement, pilots and aircraft and other equipment must be held in a high state of readiness. Woods stressed the importance of planned preparations, study of the topography of the timber areas to be treated and the hazards of low altitude flying.

Woods stated that the forestry department will make arrangements for the necessary air strips for use by the spray airplanes. Separate contracts will be awarded to provide for insecticide, storage and airplane loading facilities.

Each contractor will be required to provide a chief pilot, ground supervisor and sufficient personnel to maintain and operate the aircraft. Number of aircraft to be provided for each of the forest areas to be sprayed will be specified in the bid invitation. All interested aircraft concerns may obtain copies of the bid prospectus from the state forester, Salem.

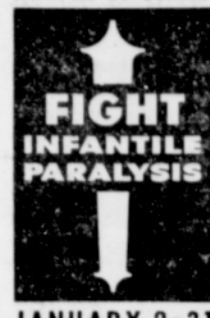
Oregon Youth Given Green Guard Awards
