Davidsons Hold Special Services

The Rev. and Mrs. F. R. Davidson of Kalamazoo, Mich., are holding special services in the local Assembly of God church, beginning Thursday, May 21. The Rev. Edgar White reports that the Davidsons have traveled widely and bring a wealth of material in the way of travelogues, current events, happenings and conditions in far away places as well as sound, fundamental Gospel messages.

Mrs. Davidson is an accomplished musician on the piano and accordion as well as an able speaker. The Rev. Davidson was instructor in a number of our Bible institutes and colleges for several years.

Six years ago the U. S. Government sent the Rev. Davidson to Europe on a special relief mission, on which trip he finally ended up behind the Iron Curtain in the land of Poland. He saw the horrors of total war, studied the people and conditions first hand.

For many years the Rev. Davidson has been a close student of the different "isms" of Europe, especially Communism.

In the current services here in the local church the Rev. Davidson will be giving special addresses on Total War, present trends and conditions in Europe, Russia, her origin, her ambitions and her final destiny. Many Old Testament as well as New Testament prophecies are cited in their relationship with present world conditions and current events.

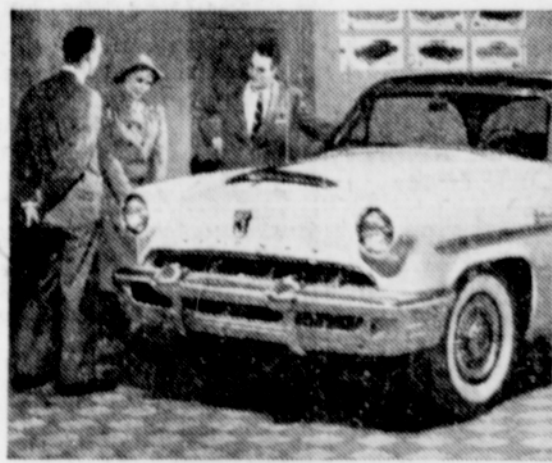

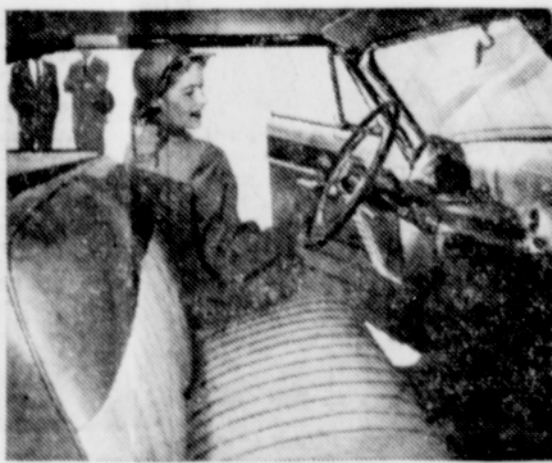
