CRESWELL—A hearing on the following proposed budget for the next fiscal year for Creswell has been set for Monday, June 8 preceding the meeting of the city council.

Expenditures: Lights, \$1322.04; printing and postage, \$50; state industrial and social security payments, \$26.48; city library, \$360; recorder-treasurer, salary, \$360; police and street salary, \$2400; jail maintenance and city hall, \$100; play ground, \$100; streets, \$1,000; fire department, \$500; health department, \$250; legal council, \$100; treasurer's bond, \$50; auditing, \$100; emergency, \$400; delinquent taxes, \$150; grader, \$573.67; election, \$32.50; truck, \$1200; special street fund, \$4,322.86.

This is a total of \$13,259.55. Last year's budget called for \$7,344.88. The increase is due mainly to the purchase of a city truck.

Receipts Up

Receipts are estimated as follows: Mountain State tax, \$1,700; state liquor commission, \$700; liquor investigation fees, \$20; dance permits, \$10; miscellaneous amusement and machine taxes, \$1,000; building permits, \$60; miscellaneous receipts, \$30; fines, \$25; dog tax, \$50; general fund appropriation, \$1,118.26; franchise, \$10; state highway fund, \$4,322.86; school districts 40 and 12, \$133; truck sale, \$100; to raise by taxation, \$3,960.43.

The total of \$13,359.55 is an increase of \$5,914.67 over last year. The budget for the water collector department includes the following: collector, \$120; power, \$1,800; salary, \$1,500; pipes and printing, \$200; meters, postage and miscellaneous, \$2,500; bond, \$2,000; bond interest, \$1,040; truck and grader expenses, \$400; emergency, \$500; state industrial and social security, \$70; extra labor, \$250; reserve, \$820; truck, \$800.

This is a total of \$12,000 as compared with a total of \$10,260 for the last fiscal year. The estimated water receipts amount to \$12,000 compared with \$10,200 for the last year.

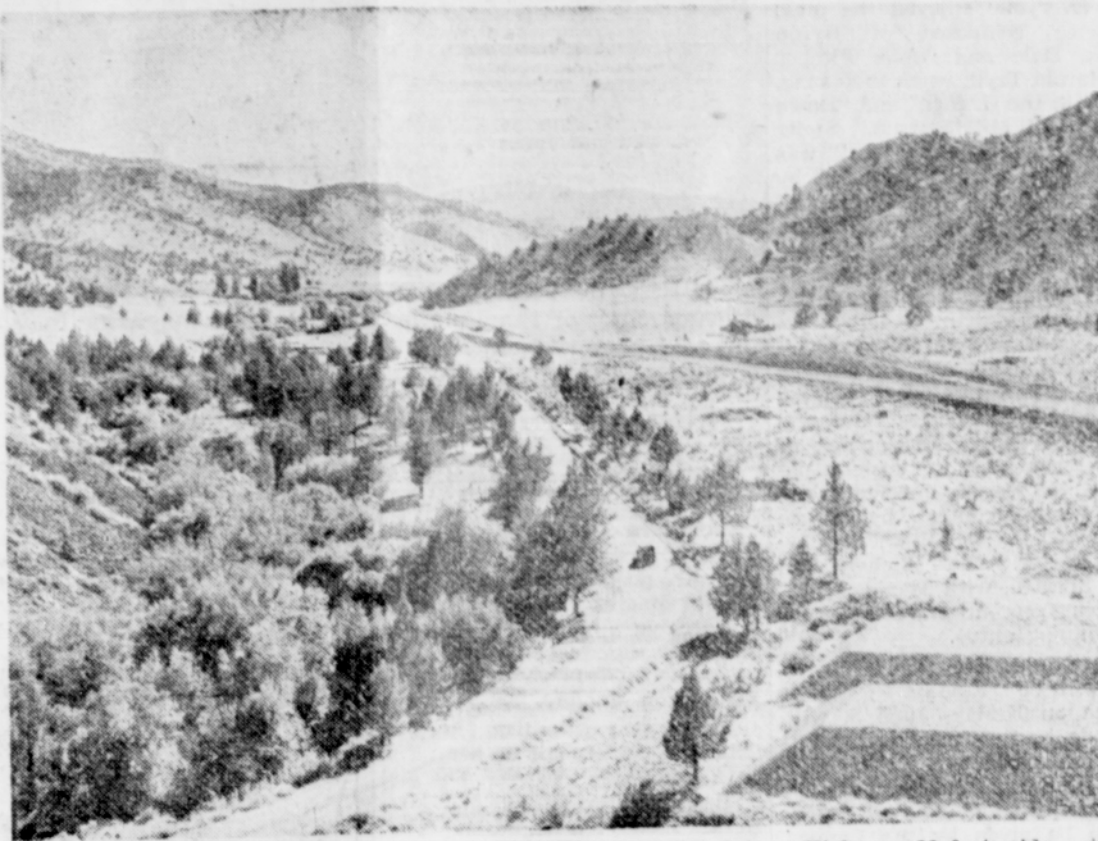
Post Office Seeks Substitute Clerk
