Oregon traffic smash-ups have killed 113 persons so far this year.

A breakdown by month shows January with 35 deaths, February, 23; March, 27; and April, 28. Newbury said the April figure may still go higher if delayed reports are received, or if persons injured in accidents succumb.

The four month toll exceeds that recorded for the corresponding period last year, when 106 fatalities were reported.
