Rural Sociologist Will Speak to 4-H Leaders Here 25th



Dr. Edith J. Freeman, Extension Rural Sociologist Oregon State College

Dr. Edith J. Freeman, extension rural sociologist at Oregon State college, will speak on "Home Backgrounds We Find in 4-H" at the monthly South Lane Leaders Association Monday evening at the library clubroom.

Other parts of the program will include team demonstrations by members of the Row River Hustlers 4-H club under the leadership of George Woodworth and accordion solos by James Webb, Silk Creek 4-H club member.

Guests will be Hattie Mae Rhonemus and Jack Gurton, county agents.

Dr. Freeman, who has been at OSC since 1946, is a midwesterner by birth and a west-coaster by choice. She studied home economics at the University of Washington, Seattle and family relations and rural sociology at Cornell university, Ithaca, New York. She has done research in the areas of marriage, family and community relationships.

Studies Rural Families

Mrs. Freeman's working years include experience as homemaker, commercial home economist for a large chain of food stores, public relations representative for the baking industry of western Washington; teaching in a grade school in Hawaii; high school teaching in North Dakota and Washington; and college teaching in New York City and upstate New York, plus experience in adult education in Seattle, rural New York and rural Oregon.

In Oregon she is completing a study of representative families on small rural acreages or part-time farms to develop a better understanding of the problems facing this rapidly increasing group.

Mrs. Freeman speaks appreciatively of the privilege of working with rural families, both in Oregon and elsewhere. "I have learned far more from rural families than from my university training," she comments. "It fills me with humility to reflect on the good job they do, the contribution they make toward understanding what makes us tick in family and community life."
